In his Budget speech in the Assambly yesterday, the Treasurer (Mr. Hill) announced an estimated deficit of £1,489,507 in the State's accounts. There is to be no increase in taxation

The amended scale of taxation was introduced in July, thus robbing the Budget speech of one of its usually most important features.

Revenue, Mr. Hill said, was estimated at £10,191,753, and expenditure
at £11,681,260. Expenses had been cut by £558,408 compared
with the last financial year. It was estimated that this year's
revenue would be £534,000 less than last year. It was proposed
to omit from expenditure £203,000 for depreciation on wasting
assols and £131,000 less inhibite, found. assets, and £113,000 for sinking fund on funded deficiencies.

"We have put into operation the whole of the reductions set out in the report of the economic experts," said Mr. Hill, "and although we are still confronted with a heavy deficit, we have made all the adjustments that we are expected to make."
