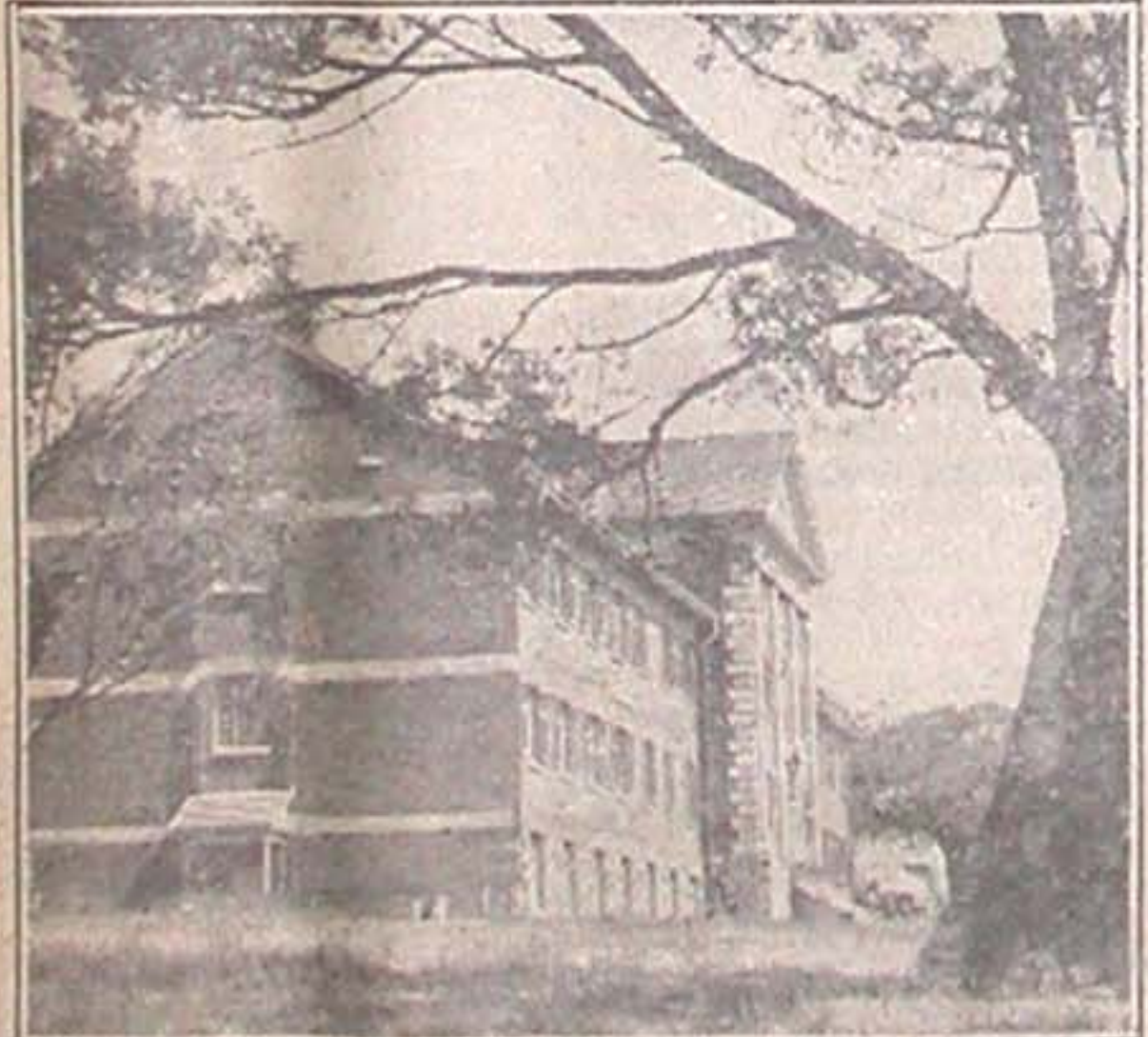

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PERMANENT BODY TO FIND JOBS FOR WORKLESS

Premiers Appoint Experts and Will Call Big Conference

NATION-WIDE MOVEMENT PLANNED

MELBOURNE, Today.

THE Premiers' Conference today decided to establish a permanent secretariat to deal with the absorption of the workless in productive works.

The secretariat will consist of Messrs. H. W. Gepp (Commonwealth Consultant on Development), J. Gunn (Director of Development), J. F. Murphy (Assistant Director of Development), Dr. A. C. D. Rivett (chairman of the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research), Prof. L. G. Melville (economic adviser to the Commonwealth Bank Board), E. J. Mulvany (secretary to the Federal Department of Markets), and Prof. L. F. Giblin (Acting Commonwealth Statistician), who will represent the Commonwealth Treasury.

It is proposed to convene a special conference of the various States to create work; to set up special committees representing all interests, and to correlate the work done in each State.

THE secretariat will be added to by nominees of the State Governments, to consider specific matters dealing with the States. The secretariat will deal also with replies to the Prime Minister's questionnaire to the State Governments requesting details of proposed works by Government departments and local governing bodies. It will have power to confer with private industrialists and representatives of the workers whenever necessary, and will make recommendations to Mr. Scullin.

A standing committee on agriculture will be called together to:—

- a. Adopt immediate plans to stimulate production and employment on existing farms.
- b. Classify areas capable of improvement, with a view to absorbing labor

and increasing productivity.

- c. Determine the practicability of establishing small agricultural holdings with detailed plans.
- d. Adopt long-range plans for intensifying development.

The Commonwealth Government will accept the responsibility within limitations of providing funds for exploring avenues and carrying out fundamental experiments with a view to issuing "national prospectuses" for the information of interested parties with capital.

Mr. L. L. Hill (Premier of South Australia) will not now move for the creation of a national emergency executive. He said after the conference adjourned for lunch today that the decision to appoint a permanent secretariat adequately met the requirements of his plan.
