

ESTABLISHED IN PERTH Perth, November 19 A meeting of the University Senate decided last night that the University of Western Australia should grant the degree of Bachelor of Science in Forestry.

In addition to subjects to be taken at the University, the course will include two years at the Australian Forestry School at Canberra, under a syllabus to be approved by the University and the passing of examinations set at the end of the course.

Various amendments to the statutes and regulations of the University of Adelaide will be considered at a meeting of the University Senate on Wednesday next.

It is proposed that the Thilnie Scholarship, donated by the Chancellor (Sir George Murray), in memory of the family of Thilnie, should be awarded to a candidate for the honors degree of Bachelor of Arts who shall be placed highest in modern history on the ordinary degree. The scholarship will be awarded on the ordinary degree examination only if there is a candidate for the final honors examination.

Various amendments to the Regulations relating to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Master of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Master of Laws, Bachelor of Education, Diploma of Commerce, and musical degrees will be submitted for approval. Regulations will also be submitted providing for a Diploma of Public Administration. To attain this diploma candidates who have not passed the Leaving Examination in English literature will be required to attend a course of instruction in English composition for two years, and all candidates will attend lectures and pass examinations in public administration, public finance, and two courses of which one must be in English language and literature.

The subject of public finance and administration was formerly included in the Diploma in Commerce examination. Candidates who received the diploma in Commerce of the Administration are to be styled Associates of the University, and are to be entitled to use the letters A.U.A. These letters are also preferred for those awarded the diploma of the Senate in Music.

The Senate of the University of Adelaide will next Wednesday consider a proposition to establish two exhibitions in music of the value of £1212 each, to be awarded each year to the most promising candidates who obtain honors in Organ, Harp, or Piano in the September examinations in South Australia and Britain. This is in addition to the existing two exhibitions awarded in the Grade IV examination.

ADV. 22 11 29 THE DENTISTS BILL From "MOLAR." Progress—The members of the Legislative Council will do well to ponder before passing the Dentists Bill. What is the use of a costly Dental Hospital if dentists are to be turned out by Act of Parliament in the B.D.S. course as an expensive as the M.B., B.S., and if every few years dentists will be so politically made, who will be so foolish as to do so? (By Act of Parliament) time they will be better employed if they would confine their attention to reconstructing the present dental Board, as the dental profession really is dissatisfied concerning same, and not make dentistry exist for that purpose.

REG. 22 11 29 EMPIRE MARKETING BOARD GRANTS £161,927 Allotted to Australia LONDON, Wednesday.—The Lunn Secretary for the Colonies (Mr. Lunn), replying to a question in the Commons today, announced that the Empire Marketing Board had approved four grants to Australia, totaling £8,300; seven to New Zealand, totaling £37,883, and one to Canada and New Zealand, totaling £161,927. Proposals from Canada and New Zealand were being considered.

ADV. 23 11 29 Dr. F. S. Hone, one of the two delegates appointed by the Commonwealth to the advisory council of the newly-established school of public health and tropical medicine in Sydney, left Friday to attend the first meeting of the council which will decide details as to the curriculum and other matters for the school, the first session of which will begin early next year. As a result of the report of the National Commission of Health, the school has been established and staffed by the Commonwealth in conjunction with the Sydney University, on whose grounds the school is situated. Dr. Harvey Sutton will be the first professor in charge of the school.

TWENTY-FOUR tenders have been received by the architects (Messrs. Woods Bagot, Jory & Laybourne Smith) for the building of the John Darling Laboratory at the Waite Research Institute. The University Council will deal with them on Friday. In June Mr. Harold Darling, on behalf of the family of the late Mr. John Darling, gave the University £10,000 to create a Commonwealth centre for soil research at the Waite Institute. The Darling family had previously given the University £15,000 for medical laboratories; the fine Darling building was erected some years ago on North terrace. The new building at Urrbrae will form the north wing of the Melrose chemical laboratory, which was built after a gift of £10,000 from Sir John Melrose, and was opened in April.
