Their worship is called 'the feather worship', their shrine is ornamented with feathers, and the religious constitutes 'Oahu's oldest & most vigorous work'." Inhabitants - pop. about 4,000.

Rarotongan King about 34 years old & killed 2 wives. Has about 20 wives, with his walled tower, with the residence of a mortal despot.

P. 11. "most of the G.I. are entirely decorative. We found no chiefs at the host of islands that we visited. From Avarua to Rarotonga the people are accustomed to meet in their council houses & discuss & settle all matters of state."

Dear Mr. Taylor,

I must apologize for not having answered your letter of the 2nd July, 1936, for so long. Actually I was in Honolulu in July and Fiji until September, when I went to live in Zanzibar and Pemba until May this year. Your letter did not reach me until my return here in July and then I went off almost immediately in charge of an expedition to the Phoenix Islands, away to the eastwards. So you see I have my excuses.

I enclose a list of some additional works mentioning Ocean Island and hope it may prove of some use to you. I keep my own bibliographical lists on cards indexed under the following heads:-

(a) Gilbert Islands.

(b) Ellice Islands.

(c) Phoenix Islands.

(d) Fanning, Washington, and Christmas Islands.

Unfortunately I have made no distinction between Ocean Island and the Gilbert Islands of which it is, at any rate from an ethnological point of view, a part. So I'm afraid I have only been able to include in the enclosed list those articles on my Gilbert Islands cards which for some reason or another I've noted as mentioning Ocean Island.

Concerning Nauru I know little, as it is not part of this Colony, though my wife has just returned from a two months visit there collecting "String Figures". I enclose, however, particulars of a few works mentioning Nauru taken from a small bibliography I once started on the more important islands of Micronesia.

I'm sorry I did not meet you last year - I spent a fortnight working in the Turnbull Library in May. How I envy you down there, surrounded with books. Every work I want to consult - and they are many - I have to buy, or else have the extracts typed out for me at considerable expense. As I am seldom on any one island for more than three months at a time I have to carry hundreds of books around with me, a proceeding which is not conducive to their preservation.

Please do not hesitate to write to me if there is any other information you would like re this part of the world.

By the way I seem to remember that the only one

of Louis Becke's works not in your library was "Breachley Black Sheep". I was in an Auckland book shop last year - I think it was called Brookings - and the proprietor said that he had a copy in his private collection which he could let you have.
