For the forty-first consecutive year, ROCA presented their "Award of Merit" to a notable Old Collegian who has provided meritorious and outstanding service to agriculture, Roseworthy Campus, ROCA and the community. The 2001 "Award of Merit" was presented to Brian C. Jefferies AM (RDA 1950).

Brian typifies the best of the Roseworthy tradition. He comes from a farming family, he is a competent shearer and qualified woolclasser; he graduated from the College with First Class Honours, won the Gold Medal and was awarded the Ridley Memorial Scholarship to study Agricultural Science at Adelaide University. He took an active part in sport at the College where he was successful in football and long distance running. At University he brought to his studies a solid practical grasp of the farming world and he built his scientific career on those foundations, so that he spent his professional life using that science and his practical experience to solve farming problems.

Brian's international work puts him amongst the small number of Roseworthy graduates who have a genuine international reputation and who have helped to foster the international recognition that the College has enjoyed for some years. His fields of endeavour have included Sheep Breeding/Genetics, Sheep Classing, Wool Classing, Animal Production (Sheep/Goats), Animal Nutrition (Sheep), Extension (Sheep & Wool) and Tour Leader/Guide (Spanish or English).

Brian's writing has been prolific. He has produced at least 120 articles and research papers, written one book and collaborated in a section of another. He is, or has been, a member of many organisations to do with his professional life, and a number of others arising from his commitment to the humanity of the world.

Brian Jefferies' career and life have had many facets, but he has always impressed by being consistent, open and articulate whilst displaying integrity throughout all.

ROSEWORTHY FOUNDATION

There is ongoing work happening towards the establishment of the Roseworthy Foundation referred to in the previous Digest. Because it relates to a Campus of the University, it is essential that it be integrated with other financial arrangements connected with the University. With the recent changes in hierarchy and structure this has proved to be a complex process. Negotiations are also continuing between the University, Professor Simon Maddocks and various prominent people in the community, who have had and still have a strong association with Roseworthy, in relation to the role they may play in its establishment and ongoing operation.


They came from far and wide for this momentous occasion, and from all accounts everyone thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

Agricultural Science graduates of the 1950's and 1960's will be saddened to learn of the passing of Dr. Peter Brownell in mid-July after a short illness. Peter, known affectionately as "Umm", was mentor and popular colleague of agricultural science students who undertook botany studies at the University of Adelaide. He was always invited to annual student dinners and regularly participated in staff/student rugby matches. Peter epitomised the expression "he is a gentleman and a scholar".

Peter's studies at Roseworthy Agricultural College began in 1941, but were interrupted by World War 2, where he served as an RAAF pilot in Canada and in the U.K. as a pilot in Bomber Command. On returning to Adelaide, he completed his R.D.A. (1947) and then BAgSc (1951) and PhD (1958) degrees at the University of Adelaide. Between 1951 and 1953 he worked as a soil conservation officer in the SA Department of Agriculture.

In 1967, Peter transferred to the University College of Townsville, later to become the James Cook University, as the first lecturer in plant physiology, and later was appointed Associate Professor in the Department of Tropical Plant Sciences. Upon retirement in 1987, he was appointed Adjunct Associate Professor and continued to pursue active "hands on" research with many post-graduate students. He was the Patron of the James Cook Rugby Football Club and Patron of Townsville District Rugby Union. He was Deputy Chairman of the University's Hall of Residence Board and a life member of University Hall.

Peter gave long and distinguished service to Legacy – a service to families of service men and women who died during or after operational war service. He joined Legacy in Townsville in 1970 and served as a member, as a President and Past President, and as Education Officer for over 20 years.

Peter made a major contribution to Plant Science. He was the first person in the world to demonstrate that sodium was an essential nutrient for some plants. This was spectacularly true for Australian saltbush, *Atriplex vesicaria*. His pioneering research was conducted within the Botany Department of the University of Adelaide and in a glasshouse on top of the Geology building, where the incoming air had to be filtered to remove salt from the wind-borne sea-spray. Many years later a novel photosynthesis pathway was identified in what have come to be known as C4 plants. Peter realised that his plants, which responded to sodium, belonged to this group of plants. His later research concentrated on investigating the metabolism and physiology of C4 plants in an effort to discern the role of sodium in these plants.

In 1994, Dr. Brownell was awarded the Sir Joseph Verco Medal by the Royal Society of South Australia for his contribution to science, and in the same year received his D.Sc. from the University of Adelaide. In 1998, he was awarded an OAM for his contribution in the field of plant physiology and education, and for services to the Townsville community.

Peter was the second son of Dr. Herbert Percival Brownell and Mollie Brownell of Norwood.

A commemorative gathering will be held in Adelaide at Urrbrae House, Waite Campus of the University of Adelaide, on Tuesday September 10th at 2.30pm. Peter's friends and associates will be welcome. Further details can be obtained from Jo Orr (08 8575 5035) or Max Tate 08 8303 7227).

Well, after that, Peter decided to wind it up, and not long ago he died. The funeral was in Townsville. We are holding a commemorative gathering at Urrbrae House at the Waite, on Tuesday September 10^{th} at 2.30pm.

Basil Sheahan – BAgrSc, DipEd, DipAgrExt, AdvDipEd, FAIAST (1934-2002)

Roseworthy students, colleagues, and the myriad of other people enriched by Basil's humanity will be extremely sad to hear that he passed away from heart and associated problems in late July

Basil devoted his career to agricultural extension. After graduating in Agricultural Science from Melbourne University in 1958, he was an extension officer and then Deputy Manager at the Mallee Research Station at Walpeup. He then had a brief period teaching agriculture to secondary students, completed a Graduate Diploma in Agricultural Extension and joined Roseworthy Agricultural College as Senior Lecturer in Agricultural Extension in 1972. He retired from Roseworthy in 1994.

During his time at Roseworthy, he developed a close association with international students, helping them cope with cultural and social differences. He coordinated and supervised several international projects, as well as providing tertiary training in extension, recognised as among the best in Australia. He made notable contributions to understanding the role of mass media in agricultural extension, and the attitudes of landowners to changes in the conservation movement. [continued on page 14]



The 2002 Farrer Memorial Medal has been awarded to Associate Professor Gil Hollamby, for his "significant contribution to the wheat industry in Australia". The Farrer Memorial Medal, first presented in 1941, is conferred annually to perpetuate the memory of wheat breeder, William James Farrer, and to provide encouragement and inspiration to Australian agricultural scientists.

Gil Hollamby, former leader of the wheat breeding research team at Adelaide University, has been involved in breeding wheat varieties since 1961. During his impressive career, he has bred a succession of high yielding wheat varieties adapted to the variable climatic and edaphic environments of Southern Australia. His varieties include: Blade, Dagger, Excalibur, Machete, Spear, Stiletto and Trident. During the 1990's Spear became the most widely grown wheat variety in Australia.

He received the Farrer Memorial Medal at the Elder Hall, University of Adelaide, on 3rd September 2002, to coincide with the Royal Adelaide Show. Well-wishers joined Gil in an informal supper after the ceremony.

RULES GOVERNING THE

ROCA AWARD OF MERIT

- The Roseworthy Old Collegians Association (ROCA) shall periodically award a medal to a ROCA member who has
 mad a meritorious contribution in any field of agricultural activity and/or ROCA or community affairs. For the
 purpose of these rules, "agricultural activity" shall be given the widest possible meaning and will include all aspects of
 animal, land and natural resource management.
- The award shall be considered annually and if in the opinion of the Selection Committee, there is no candidate of sufficient merit, no award shall be made.
- A prospective candidate must be a ROCA member and the nomination shall be prepared and signed by two ROCA members. Nominations must be made on the Standard Form and must include the information required thereon.
- 4. Nominations with the supporting data must reach the ROCA Secretary by 30 June each year. The Executive shall review the nominations and have the right to reject any nomination deemed unsuitable before submitting the nominations to the Selection Committee.
- 5. The Executive may, at its discretion, include for consideration any candidates previously nominated.
- 6. The Selection Committee shall consist of five members, one from each of the following fields:
 - primary production research and/or extension;
 - public service;
 - primary production;
 - agriculture related industry and
 - the President of ROCA.
- 7. The Executive shall appoint to the Selection Committee, such persons who are in their opinion of sufficient standing and experience to be competent to assess the merits of candidates from any field of agricultural activity. Membership of the Selection Committee will be reviewed by the Executive each year.
- 8. The President of ROCA shall be the Convenor of the Selection Committee and shall only have a casting vote. Three members of the selection Committee will constitute a quorum.
- 9. In the event of a member of the Executive or the selection Committee being proposed as a Candidate, that person will stand down from all discussions and deliberations for that year.
- 10. The Selection Committee shall make its nomination to the Executive at least four weeks prior to the date of presentation of the award.
- 11. Members of the Executive and the Selection Committee are requested to hold the names of the candidates in strict confidence.

Extracts from Eulogies at his funeral.

- Basil had a long association with sport from his early days of football playing and coaching at Walpeup, through his coaching of the Roseworthy Agricultural College football team when it was the Premier team in its association, to his coaching of the junior tennis teams in the Roseworthy township.
- He was involved with both the Gawler and Balaklava-Mallala parishes of the Catholic Church as well as with the Salesian Order of the Catholic Church from his early days teaching at a Salesian secondary school in rural Victoria, to recent associations resulting in the Order providing the Parish Priest for Gawler.
- He had a long-term participation with the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, from a lad at secondary school to his long service as Treasurer of the Gawler group, and helping with Fred's Van which provided meals to the needy in Gawler.
- Basil and Pat had both been active members of the Indo-China Refugee Association, and its successor the Refugee Association. Testimony to his contribution was given by a special eulogy and by the presence of many people who had come to Australia from South Vietnam.
- Recognising the service that Basil and Pat had rendered to the community, they were jointly given the award of "Gawler Citizen of the Year" on Australia Day 2001.



Allan Callaghan is remembered as a distinguished agricultural scientist. He was also an engaging and brilliant teacher, a skilful diplomat and an astute administrator.



During his sixteen years as Principal of Roseworthy Agricultural College in South Australia, until 1948, he established it as a premier institute. He later steered the Australian Wheat Board through difficult years of fluctuating wheat prices, varying market demand and political turmoil, notably in sales to China.

Callaghan's commitment to Australian agriculture was a motivating force throughout his life. His life offers an opportunity to consider the development of wheat breeding, the modernisation of agricultural education and the implementation of the post-war soldier settlement policy that avoided some of the problems of earlier schemes.

He worked with various government agencies in South Australia to radically improve dry-land farming, before taking his experience into the national and international arena.

Ross Humphreys is Professor Emeritus and Honorary Research Consultant in Agricultural Science at the University of Queensland. He was head of the Department of Agriculture for thirteen years and Pro-Vice Chancellor of Biological Sciences until 1993.


PROFESSOR PETER RATHJEN Executive Dean, Faculty of Sciences The University of Adelaide

Peter Rathjen was educated at the University of Adelaide where he received a B. Sc. (Hons). As the 1985 Rhodes Scholar for South Australia he was awarded a D. Phil. from Oxford University in 1989 for research into 'jumping genes'. He returned to the Department of Biochemistry at Adelaide in 1990 as a Lecturer, and was appointed to the Chair of Biochemistry in 1995. In 2000 he was elected as Head of the Department of Molecular Biosciences, formed by amalgamation of the Departments of Biochemistry, Genetics and Microbiology and Immunology, and in 2002 was appointed executive Dean of the Faculty of Sciences, formed by amalgamation of the Faculties of Science and Agricultural Science and Natural Resources.

His primary research interests are in early mammalian development and the mechanisms by which stem cells give rise to cell lineages during embryogenesis. Basic aspects of this research are carried out within the ARC Special Research Centre for the Molecular Genetics of Development where he is stream leader in cell differentiation. Application of his research to the emergent field of stem cell therapy has been a major undertaking that has included commercialisation of Intellectual Property in association with

UNIVERSITY WELCOMES NEW VICE CHANCELLOR

The University of Adelaide has announced the appointment of Professor James McWha as the 19th Vice-Chancellor in its 128-year history. The appointment took effect from August 5 2002.



Mr de Crespigny said.

Professor McWha comes to Adelaide from being Vice-Chancellor and President of Massey University in Palmerston North, New Zealand, and Chairman of the New Zealand Vice-Chancellors' Committee. In June 2002 he took up the position of Secretary-General of the International Association of University Presidents.

Massey University is one of New Zealand's leading universities, with 19,000 students based on three campuses and another 18,000 studying by distance education. Before his appointment at Massey University in 1996, Professor McWha had extensive experience in the management of biological research institutes. He has since played a formative role in the development of the New Zealand universities' quality assurance system, a system similar to that currently being introduced in Australia.

The Chancellor of The University of Adelaide, Mr Robert Champion de Crespigny, said Professor McWha had an outstanding record as an academic administrator and communicator.

"He has the leadership qualities required to keep the University of Adelaide moving forward and ensure that the process of development and change within the institution is maintained,"

"It is essential that the University's drive to build on its research strengths, secure its funding base, and support the provision of quality services to students is underpinned by effective management. Prof. McWha is committed to strengthening the University's key leadership role in South Australia by developing more partnerships with industry, other research and education institutions, and the wider community. He will give fresh impetus to the University as it works to enhance its contribution to the wealth and well-being of South Australia through high-quality education, research and community service.

"I also particularly want to take this opportunity to pay tribute to the outgoing Vice-Chancellor, Professor Cliff Blake AO, for his contribution to the University over the past twelve months. He took on the role of Vice-Chancellor at short notice pending the appointment of a permanent Vice-Chancellor and has steered the University successfully through a critically important transition period."

Professor McWha said he was pleased to taking up this appointment.

"The University of Adelaide is renowned internationally as one of Australia's great universities," he said. "In my own days as an agricultural student I was very aware of the Waite's reputation for research and teaching, and it is exciting for me to be joining a University with such proud traditions.

"Two of the University of Adelaide's greatest strengths are the quality of its staff and the standard of its facilities. My priority will be to continue the staff renewal presently underway and to ensure that the institution has a secure financial resource base so that it can continue to build on its teaching and research activities. I will be looking, also, to increase the number of international students by broadening the countries from which they are drawn and the disciplines within which they study.

"Community involvement is another area which I am keen to develop. I believe very strongly in drawing communities into universities, and the sort of resources and facilities which the University of Adelaide has should certainly provide more opportunities to do that."

The Minister for Employment, Training and Further Education, the Hon. Dr Jane Lomax Smith, said the appointment of a person of Professor McWha's undoubted credentials was a boost for the University.

"The University of Adelaide is now even better placed to help meet the state's need for a well-educated and highly-skilled workforce. The University can look forward to the future with confidence under Professor McWha's stewardship.

"The appointment will support the Government's vision for excellence in education, innovation and excellence."
