Roseworthy Campus is back to life

From Professor Phil Hynd, Director Roseworthy Campus

After 10 years of stasis and decline, Roseworthy has turned the corner and is now buzzing. The establishment of the State's first Veterinary School on the Campus is the most exciting development for decades and couldn't have come at a more appropriate time – the 125th year of Roseworthy life.

I find it difficult to convey the significance of this development, not only to the Campus but to the northern suburbs community and the State of South Australia. It surprises even my colleagues to realise the impact of the School on the Campus. By way of examples:

- A total of somewhere between 300 and 500 additional students will be on the Campus (the course extends over six years with an annual intake of between 50 and 100). This is in addition to the highly successful Degree in Animal Science which is attracting some 80 students per annum into a three-year course, most of which is conducted at Roseworthy.
- There will be 80 new academic staff servicing the program (specialist teachers in veterinary anatomy, physiology, pathology, parasitology, surgery etc).
- Forty new service positions will be created, ranging from administrative staff to technicians, animal managers, demonstrators, tutors etc.
- Investment of \$30m in new infrastructure (new buildings, specialist laboratories, a veterinary teaching clinic and hospital).
- Animal teaching resources will be re-established (horses, cattle, sheep and small animals).

The flow-on effects of these developments are enormous for campus life (the tavern, residential, sporting teams, infrastructure, cultural events and the general provision of services). Most importantly though we have a Campus that will be full of enthusiastic young people enjoying the most important and memorable phase of their lives in this State and not relocating elsewhere.

The greatest challenge for the Campus now is to reinvigorate agricultural education – a burning passion of mine and arguably more important in the context of diminishing world food supplies, climate change, and biofuels than veterinarians. The School of Agriculture, Food and Wine is currently revising its agricultural programs to ensure that we are delivering a first-rate program that meets the demands of the rapidly changing world. I have a vision of seeing 100 of the 'best and brightest' school students (including pinching some from interstate!) entering the Roseworthy agriculture program each year.

We continue to work closely with co-location partners like SARDI, PIRSA and TAFESA, and with commercial companies such as Australian Grain Technologies Pty Ltd, to ensure the Campus delivers services to a wide spectrum of stakeholders in agriculture. Discussions are underway with some secondary schools to form partnerships in education in science and agriculture which span schools, TAFE and University sectors. I would love to see a senior secondary college (Years 11 and 12) establish a campus on Roseworthy.

Major activities continue on Campus with many staff associated with Cooperative Research Centres (beef, sheep, pork, poultry, weeds), ACIAR, international development agencies, genomics programs and the JS Davies Beef Cattle Program.

We look forward to celebrating the 125 year anniversary at Roseworthy with you later this year. Come and experience the buzz.

Roseworthy Campus and Student Fund

The Co-patrons and the Old Scholars Committee have decided to award the Fund's first scholarship this year. An amount of \$1 750 will be made available to the most deserving applicant enrolled in their second year and a selection is expected to be made within a month or so. Judging by the success of the first Trevor Dillon Award many worthy applicants are expected from a wide range of agricultural pursuits.

In addition Co-patrons have been involved in ongoing approaches to graduates seeking donations but recent responses have been disappointing. ROCA members and other graduates and supporters are reminded that donations over \$2 are tax deductible and are urgently needed. A 'Bequest Brochure' has also been developed and is available from the University of Adelaide Development and Alumni office, 230 North Terrace, Adelaide 5000. It also accompanies this Newsletter.

The advent of the new Veterinary course and the intense interest already shown will ensure the long term future of the Roseworthy Campus and there is therefore an even greater need for all graduates to support our Fund.

We are pleased to report that the Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society is making available \$15,000 through the Fund to assist three undergraduates enrolled in either agricultural or horticultural courses for their second and third years, starting this year (2008).

Important Elections – Make your vote count

The election of three graduates for the University of Adelaide Council is to be held in June. The two members of Council nominated by your Committee are completing their terms. Professor Simon Maddocks and Dr John Radcliffe AM were successfully appointed only because of the strong voting support in their respective elections by our members.

The Committee has received feedback which clearly shows that these two Councillors have been champions for our interests in agriculture and related sciences in academic, teaching and research endeavours, especially at the Roseworthy and Waite Campuses. Your Committee believes it important that these two people continue their work on the University Council and has nominated them for re-election.

We ask that you again vote for them in the forthcoming elections.

Election material will be sent to all eligible voters (includes all Roseworthy graduates) at their last known address in the last week of May – possibly as an insert in 'Lumen'.

Please note that for a ballot paper to be valid, it will require at least three consecutive numbers in the squares opposite the names of the candidates in the order of voter's preference for them.

We do not know the order in which candidates will appear on the ballot paper. But we ask that you vote for our two nominations 1 and 2 randomly so that they both receive equally strong support. Both will need a large number of No 1 votes to maximise their chances of both being elected.

A history note from the Archives – the Ridley Statue

The Archives group has been reviewing the activities of the ROCA Committee since 1889. Since its inception the influence the Committee has had on Roseworthy and agriculture in South Australia is quite impressive.

Remember the Ridley Statue that greets people driving toward the main building?

The ROCA Committee began raising money for that in the early 1900s. They had it produced in Pisa, Italy, and erected at Roseworthy in March 1913 at a cost of 29 pounds. It has survived well.



ROCA Award of Merit

Nominations for the 2008 Award of Merit are now invited.

The Award of Merit is bestowed upon a member of the Roseworthy Old Collegian Association Inc. (ROCA) who has made a meritorious contribution to any field of agricultural activity including Association affairs. Since 1961, 47 notable old Collegians have been honoured by the Association for meritorious and outstanding service to agriculture, the Collage, ROCA and the community. The Honour Board detailing past recipients is in the foyer of the main building adjacent to the dining room at the Roseworthy Campus.

The Award of Merit is regarded as the highest honour ROCA can bestow on one of its members.

The new veterinary school at the Roseworthy Campus is up and running. The interest in the course has been a pleasant surprise for the University of Adelaide. About 270 first-preference applications have been received for the 40 places available in 2008 for the three-year pre-veterinary degree. This will lead on to a three-year Master of Veterinary Science course that will start in 2011.

The animal science degree has also been a popular first choice for applicants, so the animal science credentials of Roseworthy are booming. It is expected that Professor Gail Anderson, the inaugural Head of the School of Veterinary Science, will put a strong emphasis on research in large animal production, aquaculture, biosecurity and equine studies – and the relationship between veterinary and human medicine.

This will undoubtedly take the Roseworthy Campus in a new and positive direction and the initiative should be applauded. The Roseworthy campus has a very proud heritage in agricultural and wine industry studies and I am delighted that its future prospects are now extremely bright.

The Bachelor of Agriculture course needs a re-think. An iconic past does not guarantee a successful future. In fact adherence to the past just might guarantee failure (most football teams understand this!). The Bachelor of Agriculture course is not a popular course with tertiary applicants these days and it obviously needs to better match the aspirations of young people today. Is the word 'agriculture' a turn-off?

We also should be exploring what the employment market will be wanting in future so the University can confidently market the course or courses knowing that there are exciting career opportunities for their students at the other end of their studies. ROCA looks forward to working with the University on this challenge and we were given encouragement from Professor Bob Hill in that respect when we met with him recently. In the meantime, what are your thoughts?

I look forward to seeing you at the 125 year celebrations coming up later this year. They will be great and you will not want to miss them !!!
