Dear Sir,

I am sorry not to have replied long ere this to your letter 6.2.3.26 of the 17th November, requesting me to submit "a statement of all expenses incurred, together with the relevant receipts" in connexion with my field trip to Suva and Honolulu, from the 5th June to the 17th September, 1958, for which an advance payment of £662 was paid to me by the University on the 27th May. The delay was due to my having to await the arrival of certain receipts in support of expenditure incurred.

2. The advance of £662 referred to was made in respect of the following estimated expenditure:

(1) Return sea passage to Honolulu	£250
(2) Subsistence --	
(a) Suva: 30 days at £4 p.d.	£120
(b) Honolulu: 42 days at £6 p.d.	£252
(3) Field Allowance	£40

3. As regards (1) I now enclose duplicates of my Tourist "B" class Passage Tickets showing expenditure incurred as follows:

(1) Sydney to Suva (£849.10.0)	£61.17.6
(2) Suva to Honolulu (£852.10.0)	£65.12.6
(3) Honolulu to Sydney (£811.10.0)	<u>£139. 7.6</u>
<u>Total</u>	<u>£226.17.6</u>

There would therefore appear to be a balance of £16.17.6 due to me under this sub-head.

4. The advance at (2) was in respect of a per diem allowance at the rates stated in para. 2. No itemisation of actual disbursements under this sub-head would appear, therefore, to be required; and indeed it

would be impossible to render any for most items of expenditure, e.g. groceries, meals at restaurants and transportation.

5. The actual periods spent by me in Suva and Honolulu (which can be checked at the Orient Company's office) were as follows:

Suva arr. 8 a.m. on 16.6.58.
Suva dep. 5 p.m. on 14.7.58.

Period of stay 28 days, 9 hours.

Honolulu arr. 8 a.m. on 22.7.58.
Honolulu dep. 11 p.m. on 3.9.58.

Period of stay 43 days, 15 hours.

6. The per diem payable to me in respect of my stay in Suva would thus appear to be £113.10.0, and for Honolulu £261.15.0, or a total of £375.5.0. As the amount of the advance made was £272, there is, if I am correct in my calculations, a balance of £3.5.0 due to me under this sub-head.

7. The Field Allowance of £40 was intended, I understand, to cover out-of-pocket expenses incurred in purchasing, or reproducing copies of, documentary material required in connection with my work. Here I regret that I have been remiss in not keeping receipts, as I had not realized that they would be required. I have, however, succeeded in obtaining rather informal receipts for typing of records in the archives at Suva, and one from the Archivist at Hawaii for \$2.00. I have also a letter, dated the 6th November, from the same Archivist informing me that the cost of microfilms made for me was \$26.46.

8. I can certify that the above and other expenditure chargeable to this sub-head, including the hire of a tape recorder at \$5.00, the purchase of two tapes at \$2.50, and the purchase of miscellaneous items at the Archives of Hawaii, amounted to over the sum of £40. Furthermore, there is an account for copying (verifax and typescript) by the Bernice P. Bishop Museum which has not yet been received, to cover which (and other incidental expenses) a deposit of \$100.00 was left by me with the Librarian.

9. As, however, I have been so remiss in not keeping a proper itemised accounts of my payments, supported by receipts, I realize that I cannot now make a claim on the University for any excess expenditure incurred; and indeed I am quite willing to refund the difference between £40 and the sum of £19 plus \$28.41 (I do not know the rate of exchange which you work on) for which receipts (albeit partly informal) are available.

10. In connection with this visit to Suva and Honolulu I enclose a Claim for Travelling Expenses for the period spent in Sydney (obtaining Visas and Passage Tickets, etc.) immediately preceding my departure from Australia. It is unfortunately not possible for me to have this signed

by my Head of Department, Professor J.W. Davidson, who is at present in New Zealand; I suggest, however, that the necessary authority for the stay could be legitimately implied from his general authority for the trip of which it formed an essential part.

In the absence on duty of the Dean of the School of Pacific Studies and Head of the Department of Pacific History, Professor J.W. Davidson, I am writing to ask if approval could be granted for the expenditure involved in connection with my proposed field trip to work on archival material at Suva and Honolulu.

2. Professor Davidson has left the following note regarding this expenditure in the appropriate department file:

3. The exact amount of my return fare to Honolulu (tourist B-class) is £210 (sterling) and this has been paid by me to the local shipping agents, R.A. McKillop and Co. I have also obtained dollar and sterling Travellers Cheques for £1,000 to cover anticipated expenditures during my absence from Canberra.

4. As this will leave me with an overdraft at the Bank I should be grateful if the Australian equivalent of the actual amount paid for my passage, together with the subsistence and field allowances amounting to £412, as set out above, could now be paid to the credit of my account with the Commercial Banking Company of Sydney, Kingston Branch.

5. I have spoken to the Bursar regarding the above request, and it is at his suggestion that this memo. is being written. Under normal circumstances I would, of course, await Professor Davidson's return

Dear Sirs,

I am returning herewith, as requested, the Interrogatory Forms forwarded with your letter of the 3rd April, duly completed with the exception of Question 2. This cannot be filled in until the U.S. authorities give us our visas, the present position being that they have granted our informal application for non-immigrant visas but will not execute our formal application until we see them in person in Sydney a day or two prior to sailing.

I note the provisional reservations made for us on the 'Orsova' and 'Oronsay' and the single fare rates from Sydney to Honolulu. I would emphasize, in this connexion, that it was clearly understood and agreed to by your Principals that these reservations were entirely subject to a suitable 2-berth cabin being available for our return from Honolulu to Sydney on the 'Himalaya', leaving Honolulu on the 3rd September.

As the Orient Line kindly undertook to procure this cabin for us immediately on receipt of our deposit, it should surely have been procured before this. The point of quoting single fare rates is therefore not quite understood.

I suggest that it might be a wise move to urge your Principals to cable Honolulu on the subject of this cabin (if necessary at our expense) so that the matter can be finalized and the correct return fares quoted. This would appear to be as much in their interests as ours, as otherwise it might drag on until just before the sailing date, when they might find difficulty in disposing of our berths on the 'Orsova' and 'Oronsay',

- ✓ 4. A letter/ from your bank establishing the availability of exportable funds sufficient to provide for your support during the projected visit, or evidence that persons in the United States are prepared to accept, and are able to discharge, this responsibility.

It must be understood that while the Consulate General is prepared, at this time, to take favorable action on your formal application, it will not be able to do so if the indicated documents are not presented or are not satisfactory, or if any other bar to the issuance of a visa is discovered.

as a result of our recent conversation on the subject of my furthering field trip to Fiji and Honolulu I have booked the following Tourist "B" class passages by Orient Line :-

2. This itinerary will permit me to spend 30 clear days in Suva (in the outward journey) and 42 days in Honolulu, this being the minimum period in which my programme of work can be carried out.

3. as it will obviously be impossible to examine the whole of the vast wealth of documentary material relating to Pacific history in Hawaiian archives, libraries and museums I propose to concentrate on manuscripts relating to Hawaiian contacts with the Pacific Islands up to the end of the Kingdom and, in particular, to unpublished correspondence on:-

- (i) the Central Pacific Islands;
- (ii) trade and labour relations; and
- (iii) the guano industry

While my main work will lie in the Archives of Hawaii, I shall also be consulting items in the Hawaiian Mission Children's Society, Hawaiian Historical Society and Bishop Museum Libraries.

4. When in Samoa I shall be working almost entirely in the Archives of the Western Pacific High Commissioner, for the most part on material relating to the early history of the Commission itself with special reference to the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Colony.

5. In both localities I naturally expect, and shall be glad, to undertake any other work which may be desired by yourself or members of your Department. If those interested would furnish me with lists of topics which they would like me to look out for I will do my best to procure everything I can find.

6. In addition, and subject to your views, I thought of offering my services to the Mitchell Library to search for and arrange for copying any unpublished material relating to Australia and the Pacific Islands which seems likely to be of interest.

7. I should be grateful if Mrs. Mitchell could be authorized to arrange for the University to pay me the
