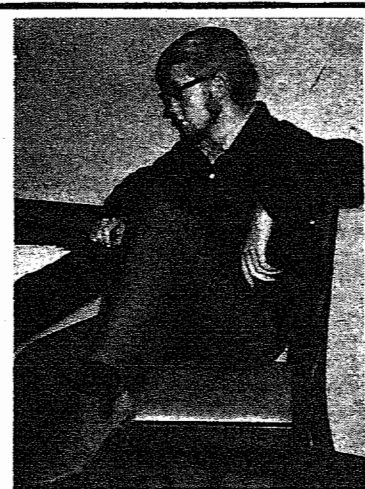

EDITORIAL

The time has come for all to cast their votes responsibly and wisely. The SRC General Elections are drawing nigh and the aspiring political geldings, set out on this special edition, are craving, (some have been observed drooling) for your precious vote.

Your vote may mean the difference between an inflated super ego or unfathomable depression. A quick survey of the candidates revealed that they really did not know why, and for what reasons, they were running; no concrete reason why they should run for this election, except that their id drives them forth; striving like little terriers to attain petty bureaucratic positions in order that they may dabble.

So that a program can be worked out, it would be appreciated if you would leave your name at the SRC Office if you intend to take advantage of this opportunity.



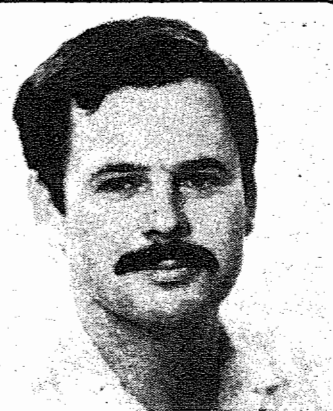

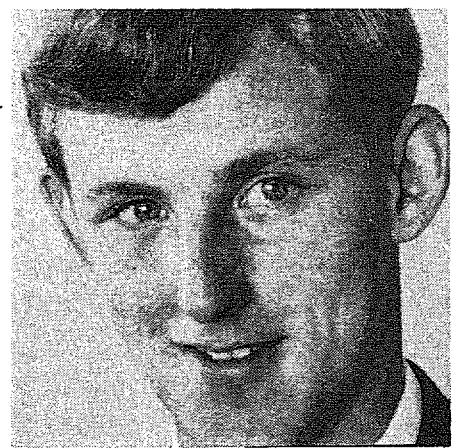

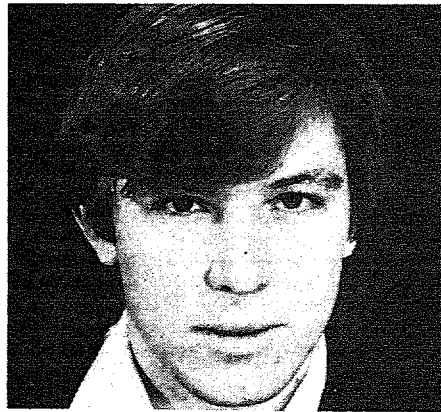
Policy:

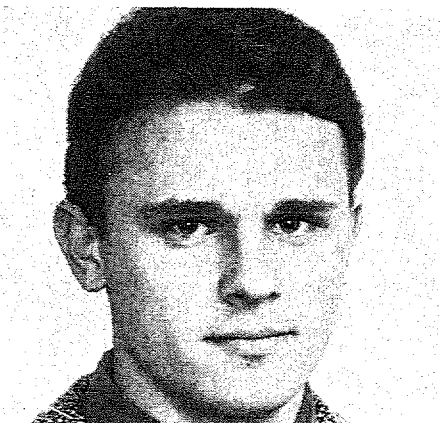
I would like this policy put in ON DIT as Regulation no. 8 of the SRC constitution allows; and not left out please.
