

Will Disney Buy The SAUA?

One of the most interesting aspects of the whole On Dit sack motion is the virtual fantasyland perception of reality that pervaded the SAUA during the week of the referendum. This editorial is aimed not at the political (whether "left" or "right") activists, rather at the 90% of students who finance but avoid "student politics".

Despite the result, the SAUA are behaving as if they had won the referendum. This distorted sense of reality is emphasised by the remarks of the SAUA President (and On Dit publisher) shortly after the result was known. The President reportedly stumped around the Student Activities office claiming that the result was "irrelevant", and if there were to be any "victors" it would be the SAUA. Surely someone should stop and consider the students. Where do they stand in all this? Of 10,000 students.

Surely someone should stop and consider the students. Where do they stand in all this? Of 10,000 students, 703 voted; those active in campaigning would not have numbered over 100 altogether. It was not this group who paid for the referendum and the campaigning, but (mostly) the whole student body. Given the massive dis-interest shown (93% didn't even vote) any talk

of "victors" or "losers" is hollow indeed! The only losers in this situation are the students whose compulsory fees go towards paying for this "Mickey Mouse" politics. It would seem, given the issues raised in the referendum, that the student decision even though it could have been far more representative, was a clear-cut endorsment of the principle of editorial freedom. Yet the SAUA President, following the result, told me that "you've really fucked yourself now, my boy," and that I was merely A a "paste-up boy". Apart from this person's insultingly patronising attitude, it would appear that the student decision is indeed irrelevant to him. Perhaps the President is a little more out of touch with ordinary students than myself, (he has been on campus around ten years as against my mere eighteen months).

This fantasyland attitude, while generally inoccuous, changes its face when reality threatens to intrude. The pirate Edition challenged this atmosphere, and the whole SAUA status quo. The response was sinister, at the least, and even dangerous, when we consider the lengths to which Meanwhile the bitter political the SAUA were prepared to go to protect their Disneyland perceptions. These lengths would have been humorous but for the challenges they embodied to editorial freedom, personal safety, and the reputation of students generally in the real world . I refer specifically to the incident involving my car, and the SAUA phone-around of the printing

and sinceI was not there to witness the incident, I do not wish to impute truth or falsehood to either version. However, the facts are: the car was surrounded, and interfered with to the extent that SAUA Vice-President and Labor Club President Terry Connolly covered it with stickers, and removed them only at the insistence of others; rocks were placed under the wheels by Woman's Officer Vaia Proios (who subsequently hid them in the womans toilets); it was kicked by SAI supporter Tom Gannon. In this incident, REGARDLESS of the veracity of either side of the story, the safty of at least four people was threatened. to the SAUA-and by extention, all students'-reputations, was done in the rediculous phone around of the local printing industry by the SAUA. Vigorous SAUA attempts to track me down in this manner have earned the ridicule of a large section of the outside community. Again, who are the losers? Not the SAUA heavies, for the most part they have almost finished their courses, it is the whole student body which has to bear the ridicule that this purile nonsense has earned. fighting and backbiting so prevalent during the referendum appear to be continuing. The Mickey Mousæ politics of the SAUA go on, with various factions (of the "left" and "right") attempting to win control of many thousands of dollars worth of compulsorily collected fees. The "winners" in the present situation are not clear; however one thing is clear-students, ordinary students remain the losers.

Referendum to sack "on Dit" Editor
Nick Xenophou failed by 10 votes.


Most student politicians agree that apathy was the outstanding feature of the election. The campaigning really began with service of Xenophou's Supreme Court Writs a month earlier, and student awareness was high. The issue of the Writs was thoroughly canvassed at the GSM a fortnight earlier. The disappearance of "On Dit" over the week-end of October 1-2, the appearance of the distinctive Pirate Edition on Thursday October 6, the incident involving Xenophou's car, his interview on SAS Channel 10, and the rawdy scenes in front of the Barr Smith Library, all contributed to a great deal of aware-

While the closeness of the vote may be some consolation to the movers of the sack motion, under the circumstances it is a clear vote of confidence in Editor Xenophou. There are different views as to why the motion failed, but some factors stand out.

PIRATE ON DIT The impounding of "on Dit"on the instructions of SAUA President Adam was a tactical error that may have cost the "YES" vote

dearly. Regardless of whether the action was justified - and there is considerable dispute many students in refectories and reading rooms were not amused at having copies of the Pirate Edition taken from them. By pirating "On Dit", Editor Xenophou threw the SAUA into a turmoil, and successfully distracted his topponents from the task at hand.

CAR INCIDENT There are basically two versions of the car incident, one alleges that it was driven at President Adam, Women's Officer Vaia Proios and SAI supported Tom Gannon. The other version alleges



Officer Proios deliberately impeded the car while Gannon tried to kick it. Again regardless of the truth of eitherversion, given Editor Xenophou's well known propensily for going to the mass media, his opponents gave him an issue to take to SAS Channel 10. This again was a silly tactical error, and gave Xenophou considerable mileage.

BARR SMITH SCUFFLE

The rowdy scenes in front of the Barr Smith library also did Xenophou more good than harm. Several Xenophou supporters began handing out copies of the Pirate Edition, and were soon surrounded by SAUA

Officials and sympathisers. The presence of three of the Students involved in the vote rigging incident, handing out "On Dit", angered many SAUA supporters, but there is no doubt that a section of the anti Xenophou group tried to provoke trouble. Attempts to provoke both Kym Jacobs and Michael Berce failed because of their self-restraint. The spectacle of AUS Local Secretary Steven MacDonald astride a table with megaphone, and Labor Club President Terry Connolly with a Polaroid camera, convinced many moderate students that the whole affair was typical student polities, worthless.



The fundamental error made by the SAUA was the attempt to censor "On Dit" with respect to Kym Bills! article "Dishonesty and Injustice" (see this issue). Again, regardless of the justification behind the attempt this gave Editor Xenophou the issue he needed to fight and win the referendum. Without the issue the SAUA - whose position was heavily endorsed at the GSM - would almost certainly have won the sack motion. In the context of the Writs, the referendum was only a skermish. By successfully calling the shots, Editor Xenophou has deprived himself of a clearcut endorsement of his legal action; Xenophou fought

and won on censorship, not the writs. On the other hand, since the SAUA fought the issue on the writs, some may argue that they lost on that issue. To this reporter, that seems a dubious proposition, since the SAUA appeared to lose control after the Pirate Edition appeared. What the SAUA does appear to have lost is the moral (if not the constitutional) right to censor "On Dit". This may be a two-edged blade; if self, "On Dit" may degenerate into a rag. In the interest of the student body, Editor Xenophou and Publisher Adam should - if even only briefly bury the hatchet, and come up with a reasonable definition of the powers and responsibilities involved. At the moment, Publisher Adam has the constitutional power to turn the Editor into a copy bay. He does not have student opinion behind him.

I have received the following letter from Terry Connolly (a campaigner in fayour of Xenophou's dismissal). Mr Kerry Hinton

Returning Officer S.A.U.A. Dear Sir,


I wish to complain about certain aspects of the Xenophou campaign in the recent referendum.

(1) On Dit, which was siezed and removed from the S.A.U.A. Printing Room over the previous weekend, was used by Mr Xenophou as a propaganda weapon in the election. The editorial was, in substance, Nicks major case. I believe this

was not seen or authorised by youwhich is in breach of referenda procedure.

Indeed, the entire On Dit election issue was a pro-Nick case. I also protest about the blank pages in the issue-which supported his spurious claims that he was being "censored".

(2) A major factor in his campaign purported AIP spokesman, which supported Nick. As you may be aware, I phoned Danby in Melbourne and he qualified this support. In fact, he stated that Nick had mislead him.



Danby's support was still being issued on Friday and was part of the unauthorised On Dit.

(3) Nicks large posters were unauthorised. Some of my material, which I submitted to you, was vetted by you. You commented, for example, that certain factors were unrelated. Yet Nicks material placed grossly unrelated material before students, as he had not submitted it to you.

I claim that this gave Nick a clear electoral advantage, which may well have been decisive in such a close vote.

Yours sincerely TERRY CONNOLLY Connolly's letter has highlighted several aspects of the Xenophou campaign about which I am very dissatisfied.

Firstly, the unauthorised removal of On Dit from the S.A.U.A. printing room. Also Xenophou's editorial was not checked by me (as Returning Officer) or by the President of the Association (as required by lawful directives given by Union Council and the Publisher earlier this year).

Of all Xenophou's campaign material only one article was shown to me for authorization. This was a letter from P. Costello, Chairperson of the Monash Association of Students. The Danby letter and Xenophou posters were not submitted to me for authorization.

The pro-dismissal campaign also failed to submit some material, this being several large yellow posters, a handout labelled "Xenophous Lament" and a hand out which was initially distributed before the Returning Officer was appointed. There was the usual bout of poster covering, done more so by the prodismissal campaigners.

Returning to the "Pirate Edition" of On Dit. This was by far the most disturbing propaganda distributed, in that it was severely misleading and in some cases demonstrably inaccurate The so called "CENSORED" pages were to contain articles such as book and record reviews, The Rodent . . column and possibly two letters about a referenda question presented to the President and Executive of the Association by Kym Bilk Also, the Editorial itself was very

misleading in several instances. Geoff Adam (The President of the Association) has claimed the Editorial to be misleading in more instances and probably libelous (against Adam) The next aspect of the Xenophou campaign which I found quite disturbing was the biased and distorted nature of their press releases. Xenophoustated in the Advertiser (Friday 7th October 1977)

"..... he saw the printing of the "pirate edition" as the only way to get his views across".

But, I offered Xenophou 2/3 of an On Dit size sheet on which to present his case. I made a similar offer to the pro-dismissal campaign, intend-



ing to put the two views on the same broadsheet for the convenience of the I believe it is quite evident (from electorate.

The next press release was on the Channel 10, 6 pm News of Thursday 6th October. This stated only half of the story and was presented in such a way as to be grossly mis-

leading. (Channel 10 are in no way to be considered responsible for this news item as presented). With respect to these occurances, my recommendations follow the

Within four of the original sculpture remained. The Sculpture was destroyed on 2 successive nights by the more pissed/ stoned members of our community. Friday and saw a football club show and Anti-Uranium Ball taking place on campus.

Sackings!

Some days ago, 10 of the Bar and Bistro staff were sacked on 24 hours! notice. This was later amended by Union Council at its' meeting on 14.10.77, to three weeks' notice. 10 people were sacked from the Bistro Bar, although three of these were retained on a much reduced basis. 3 were sacked from the Tavern Bar, and were replaced by one full time person. These people were one male and one female bar attendant, and one bouncer. The estimated savings to the Union will be of the order of \$200 per week (\$10,000 per annum). All those sacked were casual staff, who are students at this University. A senior member of the staff (in terms of length of service and responsibilities) criticised the decisions trenchantly, on various grounds. AUS. Critic Bashed

The President of the Monash University Association of Students, Melbourne, Mr Peter Costello, was based in his office on Friday afternoon of 23rd September. Costello suffered severe lacerations, bruising and a suspected fractured wrist in the attack.

Police have laid charges and have issued a warrant against a Monash University student for the assult. The student wanted in connection with the assult is a member of an extremist anarchist group at Monash University.

Costello is a noted and outspoken critic of the management of the Australian Union of Students (AUS). He was conspicious at a meeting of A.U.S. Council last week, in his demands for information on the failure of, and later removal from student control of the A.U.S. Student Many student leaders are being con-Travel Company. Earlier this year, Costello was also involved in attempts to democratise the election of A.U.S. Officers.

The assult on Costello must be seen as part of a campaign by extremist groups centred around A.U.S. against students demanding democratic reforms in A.U.S. In May this year the National Convenor of the Coalition to Reform A.U.S., Michael Danby, was viciously attacked in a Melbourne street during campus debates for the implementation of direct elections of the A.U.S. Executive. A spokesperson for the Coalition



to Reform A.U.S., Steve Lewis (of Macquarie University) said. PLO Invited

The Australian Union of Students has invited a member group of the Palestine Liberation Organisation "to send a representative to Australia in October", a spokesman for the Australian Union of Jewish Students

said this week.

The invitation was made in a public letter by A.U.S. President Mr Peter O'Connor to the General Union of Palestinian Students.

The invitation co-incides with an A.U.S. organised "national campus debate" in October on Palestine and Israel, to determine Union policy on the issue.

The spokesman said Mr O'Connor appeared unconcerned that the debate is scheduled for less than one month before Australian students face their final examinations for 1977.

The spokesman said the timing of the debate showed that "A.U.S. doesn't consider student participation necessary for a wide and democratic debate" on the issue. Several campuses, including Monash and Sydney University have already called on the A.U.S. executive to withdraw the invitation to G.U.P.S. and cancel plans to formulate a Middle East policy this year. On two previous Middle East campus debates, in 1974 and 1975, Australian students voted overwhelmingly in favour of the continued existence of the State of Israel and against recognition of the P.L.O. In 1972, senior members of G.U.P.S. were expelled from West Germany following evidence which exposed heavy G.U.P.S. involvement in the massacre of II Israeli athletes at the Munich Olympic Games. G.U.P.S. has also been involved in recruiting terrorists for the P.L.O. on university campuses in the United States, Japan and Western Europe, the spokesman said.


Thailand

(ANS/LNS) - Reports of an unending campaign of political murder. prisoner abuse, detention without trial, and deprivation of the most basic rights are coming out of Thailand. A conservative estimate, from the Bangkok-based Co-ordinating Group for Religion and Society, holds that there are still some 2000 political prisoners held by the regime. MURDERED MONKS

Two recently reported cases are representative of the military regime's current practice of "observing" human rights in Thailand.

In the first of these, Klom littamaro and two friends known for their democratic sympathies were brutally murdered in the southern province of Nakhon Si Thammarat. In January the three had joined the sangha, or buddhist clergy. They had earlier been followed and several times threatened by so-called "village defence volunteers", who are in most instances simply gangsters allied with the local power structure. At the end of January the three novice monks were "invited" by the Deputy Director Chief to local police headquarters to reply to charges that they held communist sympathies. They accepted detention, although other monks criticised the action and did not want the three afterwards. No one has been arrested,

On the night of March 3, according to a critical government official, "village defence volunteers" entered the prison and garrotted Klom Jittamaro, killing his two friends in turn. Prison authorities then put



out the story that the three had escaped. However, their sandals were found in the prison, and the strict curfew imposed in the area also called the story into question. The bodies of the three were discovered in a shallow trench shortly nor has an investigation even begun Without the honesty of the local official, in fact, the case would never have come to light at all which raises the question of how many more such murders have been permitted by the military regime

in the provincial prisons throughout Thailand.

TREATMENT DENIED

The secondcase concerns Orisa Irawonwut, a prominent vocational student leader. He served as chief of security during the Thammasat University protests last October. The demonstration was brutally attacked by police and a right-wing coup immediately followed. In the course of the police attack on Thammasat, in which one hundred people were killed, several hundred more injured, and more than three thousand arrested, Orisa received a bullet in the left side of the chin. Initially permitted some superficial treatment, Orisa was soon arrested and denied bail.

Since October Orisa has been denied any form of medical treatment whatsocver. As a result, his wond has suppurated and his present condition is extremely grave. On June 7, some of his friends sent a letter out of Thailand to reveal his situation to the world. It reads, in part: "His wound has become so infested that the whole chin is rotting. He cannot eat, and has to be fed through a plastic tube by fellow prisoners. "He is dying".

The military regime has refused either to put Orisa on trial or to release him.

Close unity had developed among vocational and liberal arts students during the 1973 struggle that toppled the old military regime. After October 1973, the Thai generals, who boast of their CIA connections and US training, attempted to break student solidarity by playing on their differences. While many lib-

eral arts students came from elite families, many vocational students came from poorer backgrounds. They suffered also from increasing unemployment in the world economic recession of 1973.

The Thai right-wing proceeded to found such organisations as the Red Gaurs, and claimed that many vocational students joined, rejecting the alleged radicalism of the liberal arts students. While this was true of some vocational students the majority of Red Gaurs were former soldiers - Thai mercenaries paid by the US to fight in the Indochina War. Most vocational students rejected the provocateur role, remaining in such organisations as Orisa's United Front of Vocational Students for the People.

US ROLE

The US Government has played a key role in the development of the Thai government as it is today. Since World War II, the United States has extended more than \$2 billion in aid to a series of Thai regime, the majority of them repressive military dictatorships. In addition, so-called "international" lending institutions like the World Bank and the Asia Development Bank - both dominated by the US have given Bangkok another \$1 billion in assistance.

Aside from this generalised support for Thailand's successive dictatorships, the US has been directly involved in building Thailand's repressive apparatus. Aid for the police- which began as long ago as 1951 - was originally channelled through a dummy CIA corporation continued page 27



Steve Biko

The Australian Union of Students yesterday (14/9/77) expressed its deep regret at the death of Mr Steve Biko, founder of the South African Students' Organisation. Mr Biko died in detention in Pretoria hospital after being held incommunicado without trial for three months.

The Services Vice President of the AUS, Ms Sarah Sheehan, condemned the South African Government in the strongest terms.

"Mr Biko is the twentieth person to die 'accidentally' in South African gaols in the last fifteen months". "He set up the Sough African Students' Organisation in 1969, and was banned in 1973 with other student leaders. He has previously been held for one hundred days without

trial, and served a five year banning order".

"His death is a great loss to those fighting for justice and freedom in South Africa. He was the President of the Black Peoples! Convention at the age of thirty".


The AUS extended its deep sympathy to Mrs Biko and her two children. and pledged to continue to work to sever all Australian tics with the South African Government.


Zaire

(ANS/LNS) - Now that a US airlift of arms and several thousand Moroccan troops have helped him fend off an uprising in Shaba Province, President Mobutu Sese Seko of Zaire has apparently decided that his country is bigger than it really needs to be after all. So he has come up with an ingenious way of raising funds to bolster his shaky regime. He has agreed simply to sell one-tenth of the country to a West German corporation, to use as it sees fit until the year 2000. According to the French daily newspaper Le Monde, Mobutu's government has signed an agreement exchanging 100,000 square miles of Zairian territory for \$343.4 million from the German aerospace company OTRAG. The contract grants OTRAG complete control over an area bigger than West Germany itself, including the right to remove any or all of the native population. Under terms of Article III of the contract, as published in the Paris-based magazine Afriquecontinued page 22

In addition to the beads and attire, both designed to help devotees forget the physical realm so that they can dwell upon Krishna, asceticism is carried over into every other phase of life.

HARE KRISHNA SEXISM

"Marriage" between Krishna devotees is quite differnet to normal Western conceptions of marriage. Marriages are often arranged by sect leaders. Their "bible", the Bhagavadgita ("As it is") lays down that "life's desires should never be aimed at gratifying the senses" and that marriage is only for men unable to control the sex desire; even then sex is limited to once a month for procreation purposes only.

Women are not allowed to assume any leadership roles or show any emotion to their husbands or children. This is because the Bhagavad states: "At the time loving service (to Krishna) is established in the heart the modes of passion and lust and

desire disappear."

THE NATURE OF INTOLERANCE

A Professor Arthur Jensen's lecture "The Nature of Intelligence", inthe Flentie Lecture Theatre at 12.00 on Wednesday September 28. "I don't believe that preventing someone from speaking is an effective or proper way of opposing them. "-Dr Tony Winefield, Chairman of the Psychology Department of the University of Adelaide. Professor Jensen's visit to Australia, and his lecture in Adelaide, raise

two fundamentally important questions. The first of course, is the validity of Jensen's hypothesis, that intelligence is genetically determined, and there are rank differences across both the racial and social spectra. The second question is what is happening at Universities, when people begin under an idealogical banner, to demand the suppression of opinions. I am neither genetecist nor psychologist, and it seems to me that the scientific issue has been very thoroughly canvassed. What disturbs me is that groups of peoplenotably SAI - are using Universities to seek to impose their own brand of fascism on the community.

Nobody likes racism, at least nobody that I know, and insofar as SAI oppose racism they are to be commended. Yet Jensen is not a racist, as is acknowledged by most of his opponents,

During his address, Professor Jensen said,

"I think the first and most important social implication (of my findings) is

that research on intelligence of various racial and social groups definitely contradicts any kind of racist position. The racist position is that you can judge people and treat people on the basis of their racial group membership....without looking at their own individual characteristics....the research shows that this is definately not true.... all human groups show a great deal of overlap in nearly all measurable



characteristics....especially including intelligence..." Why then has there been such violent learning, where "....in an acato put his views? Professor Harcourt summed up the position of Professor Jensen's

social scientists, and indeed everyone working in a University has a duty first of all to examine their own idealogical and value presuppositions, and secondly to take some account of the social and political implications of the work that they're doing...." The position is that people like

opponents very greatly. "....I believe that sicentists and the SAI have "their own idealogical and value presuppositions," and because Jensen's findings

threaten those presuppositions, they are afraid of him. To this end, they resort to labelling lensen a racist or whatever. The ludicrous extension of this is the situation that occurred in Melbourne, where in the words of Frank Knapfelmacher ("Nation Review," September 22),

"Evsenck, the Jewish refugee from Nazism, had to face Nazi salutes and calls of 'Nazi, go home. We want you dead".

What is really disturbing is that SAI are attempting to impose censorship of what may be a valid view, under a cloak of "democratic" ideals, and "concern for a minority group. It is all very well to oppose fascism, but to adopt their methods is to become one of them. A University is supposed to be an institution of opposition, to merely allowing Jensen demic environment one should follow arguments wherever they lead no matter how unpolcitable the conclusions are, and one should have to come to grips with that...." (Professor Harcourt).

If, as Professor Jensen et. al. theorise, there are racial differences in intelligence, then it is not in the interests of those at the lower end of the scale to have this knowledge suppressed. It is in their interests to be aware that there may be intellectual discrimination operating against them, so that they can devise responses to it, and investigate means of overcoming it.

The situation is that SAI are not the remotest degree interested in the real issues raised by Professor Jensen's research; they are simply interested in explaining what they see as avolatile issue, in order to identify themselves with an acceptable cause, and deepen the divisions existing in the community. Just as true racists will seek to use Jensen's work to justify their warped ideology's true fascists such as the SAI seek to use divisive issues to further alienate groups of people from the rest of the community.

If on the other, Jensen's hypothesis is incorrect, then it will only be so by further research and open discussion of his findings and their implications. Fellow travellers of the SAI, such as the Socialist Youth Alliance, at least are prepared to debate the issue themselves.

Writing in "Direct Action", Stephen Robson said of the Melbourne demonstrations that forced Professor Jensen to abandon his lecture, "....we want to expose these racists, not get side-tracked into a debate over freedom of speech. . ..it's our job then to expose these ideas. We can debate them on campus, in the press, etc." (Direct Action, September 22). Unfortunately for the SYA, however, they too cannot see past the label of racism. In the same issue of "Direct Action", Bill Hudson reviewed Leon J. Kamin's "The Science and Politics of I.O." (Halstead, New York 1974), and be-

came hopelessly bogged down in emotional thetoric. Hudson examined the historical antecedents to Jensen's work, in particular research allegedly fabricated by Sir Cyril Part, and attempted by implication

to vie for support in point scoring exercises. Professor Jensen has posed an important, and indeed urgent, academic problem, and students should respond by considering the issues with the earnestness



to discredit Jensen.

What people like SAI and SYA should who has always insisted that the be doing is encouraging further research into the environmental determinants of intelligence, rather than hysterically labelling Professor Jensen a racist. SYA are on the right track when they insist on debating the issue. They should, however, take heed of Professor Marjoribanks, who conceded that the environmentalists' case was poorly researched.

Universities should not be battlegrounds for narrow political factions they deserve. Professor Jensen, questions he is investigating are open and that knowledge on the subjects is far from complete, has a right to be heard, and criticised fairly and rationally.

The psychology Department is to be congratulated for giving Professor Jensen, and students of this institution, that opportunity. For the most part, students at Adelaide University are to be commended for their part in promoting the free exchange of ideas that took place.

Continued from page 13 Asie, "the state is bound, if requested by OTRAG, to evaculate all population".

Auctioning off one-tenth of the national territory would seem to conflict with Mobutu's claims of being a prophet of "authentic Zairian nationalism" (officially labelled as "Mobutism"); But the President-for-life doesn't have to worry about vocal complaints from his loyal citizens. As the US State Department conceded last March, "Zairian citizens have limited rights of expression and would not feel free to criticise publicly the President or his government". If they did feel free, they would certainly have plenty to criticise. Mobutu "has diverted enough of his country's wealth into his personal coffers to become one of the world's richest men", according to the Los Angeles Times. He personally owns a palace in each of Zaire's eight provinces, in addition to a 20-square-mile "presidential comain". He uses an Air Zaire Boeing 747 to ferry him to other palaces he keeps in France, Belgium and Switzerland. Meanwhile, the US Agency for International Development admits that among Zaire's general population, "malnutrition is endemic...(and) at least 70 percent of the rural population does not have access to health services".

It is not clear exactly what OTRAG plans to do with its new 100,000 square mile tract. The company has talked about building a base to launch weather balloons, rockets and satellites. But the contract doesn't limit it to doing only that. OTRAG is joining numerous American companies which have made Zaire second only to South Africa as a location for US investments in sub-Saharan Africa.

As President Carter explained at a

press conference to justify the airlift of military supplies last March, "Over a period of years, President Mobutu has been a friend of ours. We've enjoyed good relationships with Zaire. We have substantial commercial investments in that country".




