THE UNIVERSITY EXAMINATIONS.

The University junior and matriculation examinations are now completed. The class-list of the former appeared in yesterday's Register; but for the results of the matriculation examination we shall have to wait two or three days. With regard to the junior examination, it is satisfactory to note that there was a large increase in the number of candidates presenting themselves, the figures being 93 this year as against 55 in 1881. The proportion of passes was slightly less on the present occasion than on the previous one. Out of 93 there were 56 passes, whereas in 1881 out of the 55 who entered 35 passed. In the proportion of passes in the first and second classes there is a considerable falling-off. This year the numbers are-First class, 10; second class, 9; third class, 37. In 1881 they were 8, 14, and 13 respectively. Whether the difference is owing to the greater stringency of the examination or to the want of preparation on the part of the students we are not in a position to say. It is right that the standard should be gradually raised, but it would be a mistake to make it so high as to discourage competition. The increase in the number of candidates this year is a very satisfactory sign, and it is to be hoped the examination will attract larger numbers each year. It is interesting to note that fifteen girls passed at the recent examination as against nine in December, 1881.

The matriculation examination, in more respects than one, is far from satisfactory. It cannot be said that the University attracts students proportionate in number to the heavy cost of the maintenance of the institution. Considering the sums of money expended upon it there is something requiring explanation in the fact that its advantages are sought by so
