**UNIVERSITY COMMEMORATION.**  
 The University commemoration will be held this afternoon in the Elder Conservatorium Hall, and degrees will be conferred by the Chancellor in the presence of the assembled graduates and their friends, upon the ladies and gentlemen who have been successful in the various schools of law, physic, arts, science, and music during the year. The official programme begins at 3 o'clock, but the doors will be open an hour earlier, and the "wholly unauthorised" performances of the undergraduates will begin at 2.15 o'clock, while, as usual, the conferring of degrees, and other honors, will be interspersed with student harmony of a more or less appropriate kind. The registrar (Mr. C. R. Hodge) issues the ominous notification that more tickets have been issued than the seating accommodation of the hall warrants, and almost in the words of the drapery sale announcements, he advises those fortunate enough to possess the authorising pasteboards to "come early and avoid the crush." UNIVERSITY COMMEMORATION DAY.

Educationally South Australia is well equipped—perhaps better so than any other community of its size. The system, which is fairly comprehensive, is admirably illustrated in the fine group of structures on North terrace, which include the Institute, Public Library, Museum, and Art Gallery, University, Conservatorium of Music, and Exhibition Buildings, Art Schools, and School of Mines. The elementary and secondary schools are related to most of these. From the former by means of State bursaries the bright pupils, however poor, may pass to the latter; and by the aid of scholarships from the latter to the University, and thence to the highest seats of learning in the world. The Minister of Education in Victoria describes this class of students as "the salt of the community," and there has certainly been no lack of appreciation of its worth in this State. Our Education Department, though capable of improvement, is in many respects abreast of the times. Theoretically and practically its methods of teaching, of inspection, and of training teachers are, on the whole, as good as any other in the Commonwealth; while comparison may be challenged on the merits of the industrial instruction imparted in the School of Mines, of the academical usefulness and tone of the private colleges, and of the service rendered to rural pursuits by the Agricultural College. The Adelaide University is the most comprehensive and energetic institution of its kind south of the line. The thoroughness of its teaching leaves little to be desired. Those of its students who have had occasion to graduate elsewhere have more than held their own in competition. Citizens who have received only a public school education may, through the institutes and the Public Library, at a trifling cost, avail themselves of ample facilities for self-culture upon either general or technical subjects. What are the fruits of this lavishly tended education tree after a generation's growth? We have an intelligent yeomanry, and our farming methods are the most scientific and modern in Australia. Not less satisfactory is the grade of industrial efficiency. Our artists are reflecting credit on Fair Adelaide, "The Edinburgh of Australia." Even in Australian politics, where culture has exercised less than its fair share of influence, our legislators have carried a weight disproportionate to their numbers. These facts are extremely gratifying to the proper pride which South Australians should nourish in their own institutions.

But there is another side to the picture. Our education system ought to impart such instruction as to enable the student to acquire technical and professional proficiency; but if it should fail to create noble enthusiasms, its success is limited at one of the most important stages. It is not enough that education should answer the negative test of a decline in crime—though that is a great factor—or even the material and positive trial of an increase of prosperity. "We are all members of one body," and the supreme aim of popular instruction should be to promote the higher life of the community. In view of the evidences of public apathy, of Laodicean lukewarmness, and of neglect of duties of citizenship, can it be said that our vast expenditures and prodigious efforts to instruct the rising generations during the last thirty years are adequately rewarded? Psychologically, the energy of action is an emotion, the equivalent force of
