JAMESTOWN, December 14.—The annual commemoration of the local University centre was held in the institute on Thursday evening, and the certificates gained during the year were distributed. Mr. H. Boucaut (Chairman of the Committee) presided over a large gathering, and introduced Professor J. M. Ennis (Director of the Elder Conservatorium), who had journeyed from Adelaide at the invitation of the centre for the purpose of taking part in the proceedings. The secretary (Mr. Robert Cotton), in his report, stated that 81 candidates had entered for various subjects during 1905, and the musical examinations had been conspicuous for the high percentage of passes. Out of 49 candidates for pianoforte playing and singing 44 had passed. The certificates gained were then distributed by the professor. Dr. Ennis afterwards addressed the audience on pianoforte playing, principally on the points of technique. This address was listened with pleasure. The various points were so clearly demonstrated by the professor that they cannot fall but have a beneficial effect alike on teachers and students. The professor congratulated the centre, which was now the best outside of the city. In presenting the silver medal to Miss Ivy Basedow, he congratulated her on the success achieved, and referred to the fact of the medal having been won for the two years by pupils of Miss Kearney, to whom he wished to convey his congratulations. A short musical programme was carried out. Pianoforte selections were played by Misses Ivy Basedow (silver medalist), Hilda Lee (honours intermediate), and N. D. Mitchell (honours), and vocal numbers were given by Misses F. Close, E. Wilkinson, and Edith Naismith. A vote of thanks was proposed by Mr. Wilkinson to Professor Ennis for his kindness in attending, to which the professor responded.
