A family of strolling gypsy players, sitting around their fire in the market place of a country town on Christmas Eve, decide to stage an improvised Christmas entertainment for anyone who cares to watch. The five of them—Grandfather, Grandmother, Son and Daughter, and Grandson—play their own simple version of the Nativity story, each changing character as often as the story demands.



Henri Ghéon (1875-1943) was leader of a revival of religious drama in France. His plays, though written after those of Claudel, were mostly performed before them. Among the many works which he produced, the best-known outside France is *Le Noël sur la place*, which was originally played in 1935 by Les Compagnons de Jeux, a semi-amateur company. Eric Crozier's English version was produced in London in 1943 by E. Martin Browne, who played the part of "Joey."
