## Alien Enemies and Universities

MELBOURNE, May 29.

The Council of the University of Melbourne, at a meeting held to-day, had before it a report by the Professorial Board upon the question of alien enemies and university privileges. The board stated that the University of Adelaide enquired whether the Melbourne University had taken any action towards the removal of the names of enemy graduates from its roll. The answer was that the Melbourne University had not taken such action, and that the university had no power to withdraw degrees conferred. The board considered that the question how far alien enemies should be admitted to the university courses and degrees and later privileges might be taken into consideration by the Government, and suggested that a copy of the report might be forwarded to the authorities. The discussion of the report by the council was postponed.

### UNIVERSITY EXTENSION LECTURES.

The first of the series of lectures by Professor Chapman on the subject "Big guns, the story of their development and of some of the mechanical and engineering problems involved in their construction" will be given in the Prince of Wales Theatre, Adelaide University, on Tuesday, June 6. The opening lecture will be historical, and will present an outline of the progress of gun construction, from the projectile-throwing engines of the ancients to the large nozzle loading guns of 40 years ago. The discourse will be illustrated with lantern slides.

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## NEW PARLIAMENTARY DRAFTSMAN.

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Mr. A. J. Hannan.

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The new Parliamentary Draftsman will be Mr. A. J. Hannan, M.A., LL.B., who has assisted Dr. Richards for three years. The appointment will not be made definitely for several months, as the re-arrangement in the staff of the Crown Solicitor's office will be held over until the actual retirement of Mr. C. J. Dashwood, K.C., who is now on leave. In the meantime the occupants of the positions will be officially regarded as only "acting," but will be made permanent later. Dr. Richards will then become Crown Solicitor, Mr. H. A. Shierlaw (as The Register announced some time ago) Crown Prosecutor, and Mr. Hannan Parliamentary Draftsman. He already has given proof of his fine qualifications for the office, and his quiet, courteous manner and intellectual alertness in dealing with intricate points raised while Bills are in the committee stage have impressed members of Parliament.

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Mr. Hannan is only a young man—not yet 20—and he has had a brilliant career. He has been busy for some months preparing measures for next session. Mr. Hannan is a native of Port Pirie, and is the eldest son of Mr. Frank Hannan, a farmer of that district. He was educated at the local State school until he was 12, and afterwards at Solomontown Public School. In 1903 he entered Sacred Heart College, conducted by Marist Brothers at the Semaphore. Mr. Hannan passed in that year the primary public examination in seven, the junior in eight, and the senior public in 1904 in eight subjects, with credit in three. The following year he was successful in the Higher Public examination, and secured first honours in French. In 1906 he began the course for the ordinary degree of B.A. at the Adelaide University, and passed in English Language and Literature and Senior Greek with credit. In 1907, on the recommendation of the Professor of Classics, Mr. Hannan studied for the honours degree of B.A. in Classics, and two years later won it with first-class honours, and was placed first on the list. He was awarded the David Murray Scholarship in Classics. In 1910 he entered the Education Department, and was appointed Assistant at the Unley District High School. He resigned after three months' service, having resolved to take up the law as a profession. Mr. Hannan was articled to Mr. George McEwin, of Glynn, Parsons, and McEwin. He passed at the University in Constitutional Law (first class), Law of Property, Part I. (first class), and Law of Contracts (second class), and was awarded a Stow Prize.

In 1911 he was successful in Theory of Law and Legislation (second class), Roman Law (second class), and Law of Wrongs (first class). Three years ago Mr. Hannan added to his academic victories Law of Evidence and Procedure (first class), Law of Property, Part II. (first class), and Private International Law (first class). He was again awarded the Stow Prize, and was bracketed for the David Murray Scholarship in Private International Law. He took the degree of LL.B., and in April, 1913, was admitted to the Bar. In 1914 Mr. Hannan passed in Economics, Parts I. and II., and secured the ordinary degree of Master of Arts. At present he is engaged on a thesis on "Constitutional Law of South Australia" for the Degree of Doctor of Laws. While at the University he was successively Treasurer and Vice-President of the University Arts Association and Secretary of the Law Debating Society. Mr. Hannan rowed in a number of University crews, and is now an active member of the Adelaide Rowing Club. Mr. Hannan was Assistant Hon. Secretary of the S.A. Rowing Association for the season 1913-4, and played lacrosse for the University until the conclusion of last season. As a member of the Law Rifle Club he won the captain's trophy for 1915, and was second for the Law Cup.

## OUR CRYING NEED.

### TECHNICAL AND SCIENTIFIC EDUCATION.

#### ELOQUENT OBSERVATIONS BY PROFESSOR CHAPMAN.

If followed by the authorities, the magnificent message on the value of technical education, given by Professor Chapman, M.A., B.C.E., of the University, through a "Mail" representative, will be productive of incalculable advantage, not only to this State but also to the whole of the Commonwealth.

"To the scientist," remarked the professor, "perhaps the outstanding feature of the war is the evidence it affords of the strength and power acquired by the German nation through the systematic encouragement of scientific education and research. It is true that it is science perverted by unholy aims. It has always been one of the glories of pure science that the greatest of its discoveries have always been freely given for the benefit of mankind, restricted by no such things as patent rights nor hampered by any selfish limitations. The Germans have given us an example of the power of organised scientific work as devoted to purely selfish ends, and as a means of forcing their abominable military system upon the world. There has been nothing worse in history than the degraded spectacle of a great nation hysterical with delight at the news of the effective use of that triumph of scientific invention—the submarine—in sinking the Lusitania, crowded with 1,200 defenceless people, the school children of Germany being given a half-holiday to celebrate the occasion.

"For years scientific men in other countries have applauded the organisation of scientific work in Germany, both as regards research work in pure science and its application to industrial ends. Educationists have held up the German education system as the model of thoroughness and efficiency, and it is the power that the German nation has acquired in this way that we are fighting to-day. That force in the hands of military despotism is far more potent than mere numbers of men, and we cannot compare the effectiveness of the forces now arrayed against each other simply by counting heads. We, too, have had to organise our scientific efforts.

"The war has opened our eyes to the extent to which we relied upon Germany for many indispensable things, the production of which requires specialised or technical knowledge. But few people seem to realise how far British communities have allowed themselves to be out-paced in recent times. A few years ago, after much urging by scientific men, the British Government started a national
