# ADELAIDE UNIVERSITY.

## Important Appointments.

The Adelaide University authorities always endeavour to give students the best of instruction under the guidance of eminent professors. The council of the institution can be complimented upon its selections in regard to the chairs of law and pathology. The appointments, which were completed at a meeting on Friday, were made available on Saturday morning by the Registrar (Mr. C. R. Hodge). He stated that Dr. Coleman Phillipson, of England, had been appointed to the professorship of law, which vacancy was created by the resignation of Dr. Jethro Brown, and that Dr. John Burton Cleland had been selected to fill a newly created chair of professorship of pathology.

—A South Australian—

The appointment of Dr. Cleland will be particularly gratifying to South Australians, as he was born in this State. He has had a most successful career in the medical world. He was born in Adelaide 31 years ago, and is a son of the late Dr. W. L. Cleland, the widow of whom at present resides at Beaumont. Dr. Cleland had his early education in Adelaide. He took the first three years of his medical course at the local University, but his fourth and fifth years were completed at the Sydney University, and upon each occasion he was second in the list of honours. In 1900 he was appointed house physician to the senior honorary physician at the Prince Alfred Hospital (Sydney). He remained in that post for six months, and was then made house surgeon to the senior honorary surgeon. In 1901 he was selected to fill the position of resident pathologist at the hospital, in the following year he took his degree of M.D. at the Sydney University; and he then left Australia as ship's surgeon, and went to China and Japan. He studied various diseases at

Thursday Island, the Philippine Islands, and in China. In 1903 Dr. Cleland proceeded to England and engaged in medical work until 1905. In 1904 he took his course of tropical medicine and hygiene at the London School of Tropical Medicine, and passed with distinction. During 1904-5 he was cancer research scholar at the London Hospital. While there he prepared a report on the various forms of malignant growth, which was published in the archives of the institution. He returned to Australia in 1905, and in the following year he was appointed pathologist and bacteriologist to the Western Australian Government. He remained in Perth for three years, and in 1909 he was appointed principal assistant microbiologist at the newly established Bureau of Microbiology in Sydney, in 1912 he was promoted to be acting director, and in 1913 was appointed to the sole charge of the institution. During the past seven years he has been in full control of the microbiological work connected with the Public Health Department of New South Wales.

### —Important Research Work.—

Dr. Cleland has done notable and valuable work during his career. Since he has been in Sydney latterly he has been engaged in the manufacture of prophylactic vaccines, the recognition of doubtful microbes, and the microscopic investigation of unknown diseases. At different times he has published accounts of his original researches, which have attracted scientific attention not only in Australia but in Europe and America. Dr. Cleland is a recognised authority on microbiology and pathology, and has rendered great service in that direction in New South Wales. He is a most conscientious worker. His name is well known in scientific circles in Australia and England as an original investigator, and some of his contributions to scientific medicine have been instrumental in transferring from the realms of conjecture to those of established knowledge questions of epidemic of great importance to the Australian public. He has done eminent work in connection with etiology, and the mode of transmission of dengue fever. He is a fine lecturer.

### —New Professor of Law.—

The selection of Dr. Phillipson to the position of professor of law, for which there were a number of candidates, is a good one. He is a man who promises to be a decided acquisition to the University staff. Dr. Phillipson, M.A., LL.D., Litt.D., is of the Victoria University, Manchester. In 1906-08 he was Quain prizeman in comparative law at the London University, and from 1909 to 1914 he was lecturer to classes conducted at the institute of the London County Council on commercial, municipal, and constitutional law. He has written a number of books upon important legal subjects, which have earned him many encomiums. In addition to his other important achievements, he is also most conversant with literary and philosophical matters, and has been referred to as "a man of great learning, very wide reading, and notable literary achievements." In 1918 ex-President Taft, of America, spoke very highly of his work, and the present Lord Chancellor of England, in the fifth edition of "International Law," said that "Dr. Phillipson is generally recognised as one of the greatest living authorities on international law." He was called to the Inner Temple in 1907.

### —Assistant Pianoforte Teacher.—

A further fresh appointment is the elevation of Mr. George Pearce to the position of assistant teacher in pianoforte at the Elder Conservatorium. Mr. Pearce has frequently displayed his thorough insight and fine knowledge of the piano, and is expected to do well in his new sphere. He is a son of the Rev. John Pearce (secretary of the Methodist Home Mission Department). Mr. George Pearce was a pupil of Mr. William Silver, of Adelaide. He was born at Balaklava in 1892, and received his education in this State. He has always evinced a keen interest in music, the piano in particular. He left Adelaide for the war in May, 1916, and saw service with the 11th Field Ambulance up to the time of the signing of the armistice. At the conclusion of hostilities he took the opportunity of continuing his studies, and he further enhanced his reputation on the piano as the result of his training under Mr. Oscar Berringer at the Royal Academy of Music in London. He also took singing lessons at the academy under Mr. Percival Driver, who has a fine reputation in the old country, and some of whose recent compositions have won for him considerable commendation.
