Mr. C. Harding Browne, A.C.U.A., and A.A.I.S., the secretary of the Children's Hospital Special Appeal, although only in his thirtieth year, is a much travelled man. Through his work as secretary of the Taxpayers' Association he is well-known in financial circles.

He received his early education at Wesley College, Melbourne. Upon leaving there he travelled round the world with a party of boys who paid their own expenses. The late Sir Ross Smith was also a member of that party, which visited Great Britain, Italy, France, Switzerland, Canada, and United States.

At the outbreak of war in 1914 Mr. Browne sailed with the First Division as Young Men's Christian Association secretary to the 2nd Infantry Brigade. He was in Mena, Suez, and in the Dardanelles zone. He joined the combatant forces in 1916, and gained a commission in the 59th Battalion. As the result of severe wounds at Villers Bretonneux he was on crutches for many months.

While in Wales Mr. Browne married a daughter of Dr. R. T. Jones, who gave Lloyd George his first push in politics, and was chairman at the first meeting of the election campaign.

Upon his return to Australia Mr. Browne studied at the Adelaide University. He gained his diploma in commerce, and was the Joseph Fisher medalist for 1923. He established a record in securing honors in all subjects. He is a keen student of economics, and political science, and has a thorough knowledge of finance as regards Australia. Nowadays, although interested in sport, he does not take an active part. When at Wesley College he was champion junior swimmer of Victoria over all distances, and champion mile walker.
