ELIZABETH JACKSON, M.A.

Memorial Library Accepted

Twelve months ago today Elizabeth Jackson, M.A., died at Woodside. She was acting honorary editor of "The Woman's Record," a member of the Women's Non-Party Association, and deeply interested in all problems of citizenship. Psychology had for her an extraordinary fascination, and she was especially concerned with questions of mental efficiency and deficiency.

"The Woman's Record," speaking of her death, said:—"Much she accomplished in her short life of 32 years; how much more might have been achieved none can say. But she had never been very strong—the eager wide-sweeping mind had never been adequately housed—and for the last ten years of her life she grew gradually weaker, and suffered greatly from ill-health, though her mind and courage seemed at times almost to conquer this by superbly ignoring it."

Shortly before her death she asked for news of the Psychological Clinic, which it was hoped to establish at the University. Her friends, knowing that all her knowledge and all her desire were to help the children of South Australia, decided, at her death, that the most fitting tribute to her memory would be the endowment of a library for the Psychological Clinic.

To this end subscriptions were sought, and up to date £660 7/6 has been contributed. Miss Jackson was so well-known and liked that subscriptions have come in from all over the State, and also from the other States. It is hoped that the memorial fund will eventually reach £1,000.

The committee controlling the fund wrote to the University offering £500 to endow a memorial library for the Psychological clinic. The offer was accepted. All moneys raised beyond this amount will be devoted to the equipment of the clinic. Mrs. Napier Birks has presented a bookplate designed by Mr. F. C. Britton, to the fund, and this will appear in every volume which is purchased for the library.

The committee which looks after the memorial fund comprises Dr. Helen Mayo, Mrs. Carlile McDonnell, Mrs. C. R. Morris, Dr. Dorothea Pavy, and Miss Hilda Walter (hon. secretary), Halsbury avenue, Kingswood.

EXPEDITION TO FLINDERS ISLAND.

SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH.

After an absence of ten days, seven of which were spent on Flinders Island, a party consisting of Professor Wood Jones and his two daughters, Professor Osburne, Dr. T. D. Campbell, Mr. Edgar Waite (Director of the Museum), and Mr. E. Eldridge returned to Adelaide on Sun. Last year a similar party visited Pearson Island, which was uninhabited, but conditions on Flinders Island are somewhat different, a large portion of it being under cultivation, and it carries 4,000 sheep, besides horses and cattle. The consequence is that much of the interesting flora has been disturbed by the sheep, but Professor Osburne made a large collection of native plants and studied the aspects of the flora. Professor Wood Jones specially devoted himself to the mammals and birds, of which a representative collection was obtained. Unlike Pearson Island, which supports a number of rock wallabies, the mammals on Flinders Island are of the bush or scrub variety. Dr. Campbell obtained a large collection of insects and also made topographical notes and a rough survey of the island. Mr. Waite collected lizards on land and obtained specimens of fishes, all marine, as there is no permanent fresh water on the island. In certain parts springs exist, but, although the water is good enough for stock, it is not fit for human consumption. Continuous south-west winds were experienced during the trip, which made marine-collecting difficult. The collections will be worked out by various specialists, but until this is done no census of the animal life can be made known. Although Professor Wood Jones and Mr. Waite have made previous trips, the expedition was the first of its kind to visit the island.
