The pass lists for the examinations for degrees in arts, science, medicine, and law in connection with the Adelaide University have been issued. The graduates this year are—

Bachelors of arts—Ellen Ida Benham, Mr. G. B. Howe, and Mrs. Anna Tridinger; bachelors of sciences, Miss Ellen Ida Benham, Mr. H. B. Corbin, Mr. J. A. Haslam, and Mr. J. A. R. Smith; bachelors of medicine and surgery, Mr. Francis L. Stow, Mr. Cavannah-Mainwaring and Mr. Stow.

Each have been placed in the first class, while the "honors" list in arts and science will be found elsewhere. Messrs. Stow and George Ash are the Stow prizewinners this year. This is the third occasion on which Mr. Stow has secured the Stow prize, and he now becomes entitled to the Stow scholarship, being the first to win this high distinction. The Stow prizes and scholarships are given in memory of the late Mr. Randolph Isham Stow, who was at one time a judge of the Supreme Court. The conditions of the former provide that "there shall be annual prizes, to be called the Stow prize, for which undergraduates studying for the degree of bachelor of laws may compete at the examination in laws in the third term in each academic year"; while the regulation with reference to the scholarship is—"Every undergraduate in law, who at each of the first, second, and third examinations passed by him shall win (whether in consecutive years) a gold prize, shall receive a gold medal, and in the opinion of his degree shall be styled the 'Stow scholar'." It is worthy of note that the first student to obtain this scholarship is a son of the deceased (John) Mr. Cavannah-Mainwaring has been recommended for the Everard scholarship, and Messrs. J. A. Bonnin and R. H. Pellegrin—the former a second year and the latter a first year medical student—will receive Sir Thomas Elder's prize for physiology. The list of those who passed in the examinations for the M.B. degree which appeared in Thursday's *Advertiser* included the names of Mr. Frederick John Chapple and Mr. James L. T. Ibbister, but they were not classed. The reason was that they had previously obtained the B.Sc. degree, and were not required to take the two subjects common to the two degrees. It was only necessary for Mr. Ibbister to pass in anatomy, and for Mr. Chapple to satisfy the examiners in anatomy and botany. The results of the higher public examinations are published this morning. In the list of successful candidates in the musical examinations, published yesterday, it should have been stated that Miss Lossell, who passed first class in piano forte playing, was instructed by Herr C. Puttmann, and the names of Miss Kathleen Julia Westwood (Adelaide College of Music), and Miss Beryl Gardiner (Miss Stenhouse) were accidentally omitted from the same class.

The Registrar of the University writes with reference to the pass list for the LL.B. examination of 1892, in which was stated that Messrs. Chapple and Ibbister passed without being classed, that the statement was erroneous, that both were classed in the first class, and that both were entitled to receive the Bachelor of Science, which were required to pass this year in anatomy only.

Mr. F. L. Stow, who has passed the third year for the LL.B. examination, is the first undergraduate who is entitled to the name of "Stow scholar". The prize has to be won three times in succession. Mr. Stow has passed his first year in 1890 and his second year in 1891.
