

LECTURES AND SPORTS.

The summer school now being held at Holiday House, Mount Lofty, under the auspices of the Workers' Educational Association, is proving an unqualified success. On Monday evening Principal E. S. Kiek lectured to a large attendance of students and visitors on "The great rebellion." After outlining the political condition of England up to the Stuart period, the speaker showed how the coalescing of the religious and political opposition became an obvious feature of the reign of Charles the First, and Cromwell had organized a professional army, the first in English history. The Cromwellian period had proved a brilliant one, for the Protector was far from being a mere religious fanatic—he was that dangerous type of individual, a practical mystic. His campaign had been the attempt of an earnest minority to force its views on a majority, and the last state had proved worse than the first, as exemplified by the looseness of morals which characterized the Restoration period. The Puritans had fine ideals, but they had demanded too much of human nature, for there was more danger in interfering with the amusements of the people than in dictating to them on political matters. The Puritans really lived two centuries before their time, much that they preached being now accepted as in the principles of modern democracy. Their rebellion and its consequences had proved that evolution, not revolution, was the true road of progress, for reaction undid all the good of a forced reform, and their militarism was never tolerable as a system of government. The support of public opinion was then, as now, the foundation of government. The lessons learned from the great rebellion were applicable to our own era, for it would be found that the same fundamental principles ran through all history. A special vote of thanks was accorded the speaker on the motion of Dr. A. C. Garnett, seconded by the Rev. G. E. Hale, B.A.

On Tuesday morning a departure was made from the usual assembly lectures. The students were divided into four groups for a course of study under different tutors. Mr. A. L. G. MacKay introduced an economic series, entitled "The novel as a vehicle of social criticism," which is to deal with the works of Dickens, Galsworthy, Sinclair, Lewis, and other leading writers on social problems. The influence of the novel as a means of social reform was contrasted with that of the press, the pulpit and the theatre respectively. The lecturer's remarks were punctuated by some most interesting discussions. The Rev. G. E. Hale, B.A., chose as his subject "Literary appreciation," commencing with favourite poems and their appeal to their imagination. Mr. E. G. Biaggini, B.A., introduced the "History of the poor law in England." He pointed out that the poverty which characterized a certain section of English life to-day had not always existed. In Feudal England employment was assured, and despite many hardships, life generally was tolerable to the mass of the people. The break-up of the Feudal system had been largely brought about by the black death, but this had subsequently proved a blessing in disguise to those who survived, as wages, both in agricultural and industrial pursuits, had increased, though the large landowners being the chief sufferers, had done their best to prevent the inevitable change.

Dr. A. C. Garnett inaugurated the study of the psychology group with "The herd instinct," dealing with the natural human proclivity for gathering together for various purposes, and the good and bad results of the influences thus exerted. The groups will continue their studies on these topics on Wednesday and Thursday mornings, and meet for the general lectures in the evenings. Tuesday afternoon was devoted to a tennis tournament under the direction of the sports committee.

DENTISTRY EXAMINATION
Alleged Sale of Questions

SYDNEY, Today.
Startling disclosures are expected in connection with a recent examination by the New South Wales Dental Board. It was stated that for £50 candidates could obtain a copy of the examination papers in two sections before the examination took place.
These rumors soon reached the Criminal Investigation Branch, and a full enquiry was conducted. The result has not yet been made public.
It is believed, however, that a high official of the Dental Board is seriously incriminated.
