Peter Kenna was born in 1930 into a large Irish Australian working class family who lived in Balmain, Sydney. He was educated at the Christian Brothers' College at Lewisham. His involvement with the performing arts began early. At the age of ten he was entertaining the troops in camps around Sydney and by the fifties he had established a reputation as a radio actor, starring in serials such as 'Portia Faces Life'.

When the Elizabethan Theatre Trust was founded in 1954 he turned his full attention to the stage. He first gained prominence as a playwright in 1959 with his third play The Slaughter of St Teresa's Day', which won the General Motors Holdens national playwrights competition. After almost a decade spent overseas in London he returned to Australia in 1971 and in 1973 he completed 'A Hard God' the first part of the Cassidy Album which has now attained the status of a modern classic.

In 1973 he was awarded a grant from the Commonwealth Literature Board to complete the trilogy - 'Furtive Love' and 'An Eager Hope'.

The trilogy was performed in toto at the Adelaide Festival of Arts in 1978.

Peter Kenna's other works include 'Goodbye Gloria, Goodbye', 'Muriel's Virtues', 'Talk To The Moon', 'Mates', and 'Trespassers Will Be Prosecuted'.

He now lives on his home ground, Balmain.

'Furtive Love', originally titled 'Unrequited Passion', richly and imaginatively evokes Kenna's family background and his experiences as an actor in the fifties. Two obvious examples are his treatment of sexuality and Catholicism, and his portrayal of the character Doris who is based largely on the vaudeville artist, Gloria Dawn.

This work however, transcends mere autobiography in its portrayal of universal themes such as man's isolation, guilt, anxiety, his search for identity, and the conflict between his desire for freedom and the need for comfort.

Above all the play is concerned with love and more particularly man's frequently inept confrontations with intimacy whether it be between lovers, siblings or friends. What matters however, is that love is pursued and expressed, albeit furtively.

'The play is memory. Being a memory play ... it is sentimental, it is not realistic ... Memory takes a lot of poetic license. It omits some details; others are exaggerated according to the emotional value of the articles it touches; for memory is seated predominantly in the heart'

Peter is the Artistic Director of the Guild for both this year and next. He is a graduate of Flinders University and has directed for many Adelaide theatre companies, most notably the Q Theatre. His 1982 Festival production of 'The Ruling Class' for the Guild was received with critical acclaim and won the highly coveted 'Advertiser' Critics Fringe Award.

Rob is a noted Adelaide actor having played everything from Harpo Marx to a victim of cerebral palsy. He received critical plaudits for his performance as Tom Wingfield in 'The Glass Menagerie'. He has played many parts with the Q Theatre, Adelaide Rep and the Metropolitan Musical Theatre Co. He made his debut with the Guild in 'The Playboy of the Western World'.

GREG SCUDDS

Greg appeared as Ariel in the Guild's recent production of 'The Tempest', and worked on 'The Devils' as Louis XIII and as Assistant Director. Other memorable roles include Mercutio in 'Romeo and Juliet' for SACW Phoenix, and Henry in 'The Skin of our Teeth' for Court Theatre Company.

PHYLLIS DIPROSE

Phyllis is a well-known Adelaide actress having worked for many companies in such shows as 'Arsenic and Old Lace', 'The London Blitz Show' and 'Jack the Ripper'. This is her most welcome debut with the Guild.

JOHN EDGE

John is a Lecturer in English at the University of Adelaide. He is a former president of the Guild, has been a member of the Ensemble since 1977, and has appeared in 16 Guild productions. His favourite roles include von Hierlinger in 'Tales From the Vienna Woods', and Phillip in 'Bits and Pieces'. He is currently Chairman of the Acting Company.

JO PEOPLES

Jo is a favourite Guild performer having played many memorable roles. These include Meg in The Birthday Party', Oola in 'The Slaughter of St Teresa's Day' and Thelma in 'After Magritte'.
