I am returning herewith the map and list of colonies. If you wanted it, I think you might have marked the area from the information as to latitude and longitude given. However. I have now mocceded in doing that. I find, however, it is practically im o slble on so small a scale to indicate the contions of the rockeries. Childwick Stud Wood is visible, marked in green, on the southern border of the area. Sites like Coles Wood, a small wood split by the Midland main line, are also just visible on the map, but if I tried to fill it in, you would only have a mass of illegible numbers filling the whole area. In the event of someone later wanting to work the same erea, I suppose it is possible that my note book and six-inch maps might be useful, e.g. as showing that for a longish time rooks' nests have never occurred on some particular sites. For this, however. he would went to be able to identify particular trees, as could be done

from my notebook in most cases. I do not know whether you are making any provision for the parking of such original material.
