My dear Sister.

You will I expect have received my letter saying how very sorry I am not to be able to see you this week end. But I do look forward so much to our meeting next week.

I believe we shall be able to have the use of a car to take us up to Col hill. That will be a great advantage : and I am so happy to think that I shall not inflict on you either long hot bicycle rides or a stay at Col hill itself, with a large aerodrome just beside the village and aeroplanes starting and alighting all day and all night. I do wish with this. I had my own horse back so that you could come to stay with me there : I am so sorry that I have to ask you to stay in College - I do so hope that you will be reasonably comfortable. Let me know, at your convenience, on what day you propose to come.

I had the enclosed letter this morning, of which I am sending a copy to Mather. It is,

as you will see, not clear whether it is Mather or myself that the proposers wish to supplant.

Mather has decided that a brief Committee meeting is desirable at East Mallory, chiefly for the purpose of nominating Temporary Members. He has asked me to send out agenda so as to save time. I need not, I think (and hope), occupy more than a few minutes. In my own view long Committee meetings are a pity when they coincide with meetings of the Society, and unnecessary since we have Committee meetings on occasions when the Society does not meet. I remember at Oxford I was taken from demonstrating my exhibit, which people were particularly interested in, to attend a long Committee meeting the business of which could quite well have been done on another occasion when the Society was not meeting.
