I do not think I told you how very much I appreciated hearing your chapter on the sex chromosomes in man, which put the main facts not only lucidly, as you always do, but I think quite brilliantly for the class of readers you have in mind. I am returning herewith the draft you send about the sex ratio, ^{with} which I naturally entirely agree. I have here suggested a few explanatory clauses where the argument seems to be moving a little quickly, and, if you do not mind, I should like to omit the word "important", which, by long misuse, has acquired some stains and sounds a touch vague and pretentious, where either nothing or a more neutrally descriptive adjective would read well.
