Dear Professor Gini,

I was extremely glad to get your letter of July the 4th, though sorry to hear what you tell me of conditions in the University of Rome. It is excellent that your family have passed through a bad period so successfully. I have lost my elder son in the Air Force, but my second son in Egypt and my six daughters are all well. Of course, I do not know when we shall see Harry again.

I look forward greatly to the re-establishment of international relations in mathematical statistics and other scientific subjects, and hope to be visiting Paris next April at the invitation of the

Sorbonne and the Institut Poincaré. Perhaps it will be possible for us to meet on some such occasion.

I am scarcely any longer Editor of the Annals of Eugenics as I expect the new Galton Professor Dr Penrose, will soon take charge on returning from Canada. I will see that they receive a note on your offprints.
