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

Precis of the address of His Excellency the Governor's Deputy Mr. W.R. Crocker.

After presentation of prizes Mr. W. Crocker congratulated the students of Roseworthy, expressing the thought that while young people of the calibre of these students were entering the work force, Australia's future was in good hands.

He was delighted to see the stand taken by the Director about breaking down the concentration on agricultural interest in Roseworthy College. Being now a part of a different system, it is no longer the Roseworthy that was in his boyhood days having a great tradition, not only in initiations but it had a tradition for producing farmers well equipped for carrying on a very difficult job of agriculture. All he hoped was that agriculture and the related subjects were still the core of the teaching programme and the life at R.A.C.

Productivity in agriculture has increased enormously over recent years and this means that fewer people are now needed to produce food. As an example in Holland only 8% of the population now produces the food required for 15 million people. Australia's figures are very closely related to these production figures, however, this has resulted in a gradual flow over the years of country people to the cities. Hence throughout the world most Governments are trying to do something about this proportion of population in the country and city areas.

There is a strong need, more than ever before, for more study, more research amongst the rural population - know-ledge is of little value if left only in books.

Finally to the rural press their reliability of information could be improved particularly in relation to market trends to the farmer.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The Year 1976

This has been a year of active programming by the College resulting in Roseworthy College developing as a centre of agricultural progress. It has been a year of severe drought, but a year of results with the College Dairy and beef cattle winning Grand Championship ribbons at the Royal Adelaide Show. ... a year of continued shortage of facilities for students, and a year of yet more committees to review the structure and functioning of education in South Australia and in Australia.

Buildings

Student numbers have risen by about 70% in the three years in 1974 when the College became independent. This has been achieved without any increase in the amenities available to students or to the staff, apart from new accommodation facilities for 46 students. The new buildings in the three year period have been the new library opened in 1975, and the replacement of the old still at the winery; both of these buildings were designed to meet the needs of half our present student numbers.

Two New Courses

The first major new development in 1976 was the introduction of the Graduate Diploma in Agriculture (International), sponsored by the Food & Agricultural Organisation of the United Nations. Seven students are now enrolled from Afghanistan, Algeria, Cyprus, Iran, Jordan, Libya and Tunisia and fourteen sponsored applications have been received for the second course to begin in mid-1977.

The other new course in 1976 was the Associate Diploma in Farming. It is a two year course and is designed to provide a practical training in the management of farms for farm people who have had experience on farms after leaving school.

The College Farm and Practical Experience

For our Diploma of Agriculture students, our attitude is to teach practical skills to enable graduates to cope with day to day farm situations. On-site plant breeding and animal research linked with lectures and demonstrations introduces many students to the problems associated with the search for new knowledge. Some off-College farming experience in the Diploma course is preferably obtained on commercial farms, though the College now recommends to students in the agriculture and wine courses that they defer entry once they have been accepted for enrolment. This then enables students to mature and see the purpose of further study in a clearer perspective.

, The Farm

This is an experimental farm as well as a teaching unit.

The wheat breeding programme is bringing R.A.C. 266 towards commercial release - it is now being tested for milling quality on a commercial scale as a soft standard white variety. It will fill a gap which the market has been seeking. Two other cross-breds, R.A.C. 88 and R.A.C. 311 show promise.



Roseworthy's programme of research in education is continuing with interviews with 300 families in the Balaklava and Kapunda areas.

Our agricultural museum is making some good acquisitions, assisted by grants from the Commonwealth Banking Corporation.

Drought

By the end of September except for 1944 and 1957, it was the driest year experienced. With some rains in October, crops averaged one-third of their average yield, and with little pasture growth stock numbers were almost reduced by 50% on the dairy and sheep sections.

Roseworthy as an Agricultural Centre

Short courses and Seminars have been held at Roseworthy in the past year and we plan to continue these activities as part of our responsibility to serve the community of South Australia.

Professor Vernon Singleton of the University of California, the first Walter and Carew Reynell Fellow who spent some time at Roseworthy met leaders of the wine industry and was able to contribute to the development of more knowledge of this important topic.

Roseworthy as an Independent College

Roseworthy has made a submission on its academic programmes and particularly its relationship with the other State agencies and Colleges involved in education.

Although other State agencies and Colleges have been absorbed into educational institutions, Roseworthy expression is far better served effectively to the whole community if it remains an independent agricultural College. By co-operative teaching programmes between different institutions, any disabilities or inadequacies could be overcome by a State central planning unit. This then allows Roseworthy to put more emphasis on the development of applied research and management of natural resources, on the rural urban interface, or non-commercial aspects of farming and the time to develop as a College of Advanced Education.

We have continued to make outstanding new academic appointments which has widened the range of professional skills and experience available at Roseworthy. It is appropriate to pay tribute to Mr. J. Foot who retired in February, serving as House Master since 1966. His influence on College activities and on students has been most significant and he has made valuable contributions to the work of the College.

The kitchen and dining room staff efforts in provision of meals for students and for visitors are receiving a reputation which threatens to engulf us with requests for access to these facilities.

Assistance by the Community

Many people from the educational institutions and from industry have served on Course Advisory Committees and kept our courses tuned to the needs of the working world, farmers have given time and access to their farms for visits by students, firms have provided visits for students to see how commerce serves the rural industries, and uses science and experience to do it. We are grateful to all our friends for their continued interest and help.

Students

I am glad to pay tribute to John Furst and Mick Carmody who served on the College Council as elected representatives of the students, and made most significant and helpful contributions. David Lewis, as President of the Student Union Council displayed exemplary qualities of leadership throughout the year and Tim Walmsley, Chairman of the Student Discipline Committee who had the important task of attempting to contribute to the development of self-discipline among the students.

The College was saddened by the sudden death of David Halstead during the year who had earned the respect and affection of staff and students.

In hockey and netball, the sporting girls led by Judy Nickolai have done themselves proud by winning the Grand Finals of the local Competitions.

HISTORY IN THE MAKING...

Mowers and Binders at Work. Photo from R.A.C. booklet printed about 1906.



The photographs reproduced above are typical of the many pictorial records being gathered by Jeff Daniels, the College Agricultural Historian as part of a long term plan to preserve a full record of the history of R.A.C. and its role in agriculture over the years. The shot of the mowers and binders was taken by R.K. Lawrence, a student of 1903-1906. The tractor displayed in the other photo is Messrs. Saunderson & Co's 50 B.H.P. Universal Agricultural Motor, being tested at R.A.C. in 1909. Unfortunately, the machine proved to be a failure, and, in the words of the Principal of the day (Professor A.J. Perkins),"...not an implement...which can in any way be recommended to farmers."

Progress is being made towards establishing the R.A.C. Agricultural Museum, and a number of exhibits including stationary engines, a winnower and a stripper both of 1910 vintage, a 32 volt generator and a number of old ploughs have already been collected. A restoration and storage building will shortly be a reality as well.

Work in progress on the research side includes a biography of the late Professor Perkins (Viticulturist at R.A.C. 1892-1904, Principal 1904-1914 and subsequently Director of Agriculture). The historian would be pleased to hear from old collegians who may have 15 any memories at all of him.

ROBERT IRVING HERRIOTT OBE



ROBERT IRVINE HERRIOT, OBE

Received the Order of the British Empire in the 1977 New Years Honours for his service to Agriculture spanning a period of over 40 years.

Bob Herriot was one of the first two students to graduate from the University of Adelaide in 1932 with the "new" Bachelor of Agricultural Science degree. His service to agriculture began as an agricultural science teacher at the Balaklava High School in 1932 later transferring to the Mt. Gambier High School until 1937 when he joined the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research (now CSIRO) in the division of soils. He was associated with soil survey work at Waikerie and in the South East of South Australia, Cobram in Victoria and the Wakool irrigation area in New South Wales.

In 1941 he joined the South Australian Department of Agriculture. It was his experience with C.S.I.R.O. that enabled him to give outstanding service as Soil Conservator and virtually "save" much "borderline" soil, but later valuable soil for South Australia. From Soil Conservator he became Chief of the Extension Service and finally Deputy Director of Agriculture.

In 1962 Mr. Herriot was appointed Principal of Roseworthy where he remained until his retirement in 1973. It was during his term as Principal of the College that much of the updating and replacement of many outdated facilities and buildings took place. The College gained much in status and stability under his leadership.

Bob Herriot received the R.O.C.A. Award of Merit in 1967 and a Fellowship of the Australian Institute of Agricultural Science in 1962 for "outstanding contributions in the field of Agricultural Science". The Award of the Order of the British Empire this year is a fitting culmination for his service to Agriculture as an Educator and Administrator.



Dear Sir,

Jim Cuthberston mentioned the stallion CYRUS in his December Digest letter. He was still there in 1934 and was most notable for the fact that when we drove the teams past his year he would look them over very carefully. Anything under about 4 years old used to send him off his brain but the older brood mares only raised the odd eyebrow - my first illustration of male chauvinism!

"Stables" started at 4 a.m. every morning and, along with "dairying" was virtually a preserve for 1st year students only. It was said to be good for our souls.

My very first experience when helping to muck-out manure, feed, curry comb, brush and harness the ninety odd horses was when one of the largest of them stood on my toes and refused to budge in spite of the screams of rage, pain and mortification.

In 1935 the Caterpillar Tractor Coy., presented the College with an RD4 (track-type, 3 cylinder) tractor and great was the excitement as it trundled out to compete with the beautiful 6 to 12 horse ploughing teams.


The College rapidly divided into 2 camps; "Pro-horse" and "Pro-tractor".

A formal debate even took place at one stage and the "Prohorse" team won with the final clincher - that tractors were not likely to succeed on farms in the long term because they returned no manure to the soil.

No one could ever forget one of the grandest sights seen at harvest times.

A big German wagon with 2 shatters - 3 leaders and a load of hay sheaves as high as a skyscraper, all hand-tossed up by pitchfork.

You wouldn't see fitter young men anywhere in the world nor more beautiful animals then the College Clydesdales.



WILLIAM CHRISTIAN KEANY

Bill Keany, aged 89 years, one of our eldest members died on January 21, 1977 in Adelaide.

He entered Roseworthy College in 1905 with a scholarship and graduated in October 1907.

After graduating he managed the Poultry Station at Roseworthy College for 12 months until the supervisor Bill Day returned after a long illness.

When he left Roseworthy he joined the South Australian Department of Agriculture and in this period he set up the poultry station at Kybybolite Experimental Farm and another poultry station at Murray Bridge. He assisted many farmers in South Australia to enter the poultry field.

With the end of the I World War in 1918 many return Soldiers in Queensland were being settled into poultry farming by the Queensland Government and Bill Keany was co-opted by the Queensland Government to help settle these soldiers and to develop two poultry farms near Brisbane. He also built, at that time, the largest incubators (20,000 eggs) in Queensland to supply chickens to the farmers from their own breeding stock. He was appointed to the Queensland Land Settlement Committee.

Bill became the poultry expert for Queensland and judged many poultry shows in North Queensland. After some six years in Queensland he resigned and returned to Adelaide to enter into a manufacturing agency business which represented many overseas farms in the U.K. and U.S.A.

Bill was at the 1976 Old Collegians Reunion Dinner and while talking to the gathering he mentioned the three wheel Sanderson tractor which was imported by Roseworthy College in 1906. Bill said the tractor failed to live up to the manufacturer's claims and quickly overheated when any attempts were made to use it for ploughing despite

the addition of a second watertank, eventually it was used for general cartage from Roseworthy to the College. The tractor finally ended up at the Wayville show grounds as a museum piece and last year Bill understood it to be housed at the Swan Hill museum.


