

Locality - Range about 80 miles from Cuc - has hills of iron ore. When I visited that area ^{in 1909} via Cuc & Mandoolab. The latter held some miners working at gold mining.

I went with the last native owner of those iron hills. Bars were being made a main story so that he should show me & make over to me those hills & whose haematite (ochre) mine the group owned a very wealth little mole. They bartered these with neighboring groups who re bartered it - until other ended the Barlowere

It was known & valued
many hundreds of miles
from its hill, it was a greasy
ochre. There was a technical term
for this but I have forgotten
it. ~~After~~ we reached the
sites by drag. Belyzamia
was the first low hill. &
Barloweere was the highest one
of the whole range. The
Scoriated slopes was supposed
to be the upper of an
ancestral ~~to day~~.

A crude gigantic
outline of a black
man covered the
slope & surroun-

ages of the Aboriginal
settlement in that
area. The figure acted
as guardian. If a friend
group ~~came to~~ or
individual came to bark
for the precious drg;
the road passing
Barloween was the
only road he could

of he took acco & he
road he was killed
on sight. As we
approached Ballouen.
The old Native Siffi
by my side began to
tremble. Wore the
~~fire~~ guardian let us
pass & remain received
it wore he kiss &
sent ~~the~~ killing major
into us. I turned &

eyes on this
wonderful thing,
in full curiosity,
to its human
resemblance.

Its last groan
survivor clutching
my arm, in excessive
fear. & I said quickly.
You see Bonaparte - he

knows me & lies quickly
at his heel, as you do
here. The terror is
ceased, the fear
vanishes, & as we
mention Bonaparte

Where I was to
go with him next &
June (stomach) of the
ochre hills, to see the
one Native "Gooi"
time, all the legend,

he came to a small

Some passages were so
narrow that I had to
crawl thro. The openings
on my stomach - but by nature
would open & close. Large &
small cuttings & needles
in the pockets were picked
little bits here & there.
We could not see each other
in one passage & I was

Careful to save the
torch gleams upon the

ago ancestors, & it covered
you with it, so & me too
& so I give you Wilguina
& Baldowon & all the
hills between where we

Wilje sits down,
for by my Wiles I finish
all the Wilje hills.
See yours. The stone
guardian will lie down
now for ever. You have his
magic now

We seemed to be
going into the very
bowels (guts) of the
hill. How far we
went I shall never
know.

Evidence.

The matter will
be clarified by thorough
investigation conducted
as soon as beginning
of this century. We
especially refer
about 1926.

This "Weld Range Wilge-Mia" "a valuable hill" was given
to by its last owner - all the group members having died.

Another legacy was the area where the Diluna Gold Mine
was found & developed. I have known it as Goldbearing Shanty since I came
specimen to the W.L. Minister, but now not quite know the locality as it was
Sacred (native ground). This also death of its last owner of the Weld

Range. — The Wilge Mia deposit is situated about five miles to the east of the Weld
Hercules G.M., and two miles south-west of Mount Lulworth, on a ridge running in an east and west
direction along the south side of the Weld Range. The deposit, which is almost pure hematite, is, roughly,
some 150 to 200 feet in width, and forms a ridge about three miles in length, rising in many places to a
height of 400 feet above the general level of the surrounding country. An estimate was made by Mr.
Gibson as to the probable quantity of iron ore in sight at the Wilge Mia, and the amount of ore above the
general level of the country is about 26.5 million tons. In arriving at these figures, the length of the deposit
has been taken as three miles, the average width as 150 feet, the average height of the cap of the
deposit as being 100 feet above the level of the plain, and the weight of a cubic foot of ore to be 250lbs.

Gabanintha. — From Mr. Gibson's report it appears that:— "About half way between Gabanintha
and Star of the East is a low ridge consisting of titaniferous magnetite, and extending on a bearing
nearly west of north and east of south for about two and a-half miles; the belt of iron ore which forms
the chains in width, and rises in places to a height of 50 feet or 60 feet above the
hematite-bearing quartzites occurring so
