WHY THE EMU CANNOT FLY.

Win-ni-ni, the Emu, and Kal-bain, the Pigeon, were <u>womba</u> (men) and had a great fight. Winnini was a dark-haired <u>womba</u> from the <u>Pin-dan-a</u> <u>booroo</u> (inland bush country). Kalbain was a fair-haired <u>womba</u> from Koo-jang-oo-roo (coast country).

Kalbain put a sting-ray string (<u>mung-ala</u>) on his spear. Winnini got a stone-headed bamboo spear (<u>jinnal</u>), and he also had a long <u>yoong-gara</u> (throwing stick). But Kalbain had a very good <u>koor-ili lanji</u> (boomerang made from the wood of the koorili tree).

He threw this <u>lanji</u> at Winnini, and it cut off both his arms. Kalbain said, "You will always have to run along the ground, while I can fly far away."

Bye-and-bye, when they changed into birds, Winnini had no arms to turn into wings, and he could never fly.

Since that day, whenever they meet, <u>Pindana-womba</u> must fight <u>Koojangooroo-womba</u>.

WOMEN SHOULD NOT DO MEN'S WORK.

At Yardagarra, between Broome and Lagrange Bay, are a great many white ants' nests.

In Yamminga time these were a lot of women who used to go out by themselves and hunt meat, and come home, and cut it up, and eat it. They did this for a long time.

Then <u>Tchoo-roo</u> (Snake) spoke to them about it. He said, "You know you should not hunt for meat food. That is men's work. You must go and get <u>mai</u> (vegetable food)."

But the women still went out to hunt for <u>wallee</u> (meat), and at last Tchooroo turned them into <u>jiddi-joonoo</u> (ants' nests). They had broken the law. Tchooroo was the Old Man of the Law at Yardagarra, and so he punished them.
